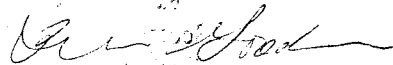

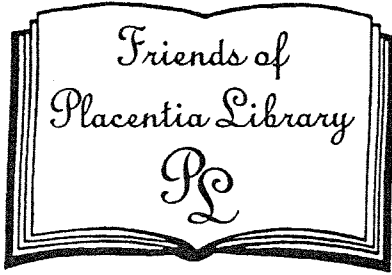
The Friends discussed the Annual Meeting Program, reminding everyone that \$200 has been encumbered for the speaker.

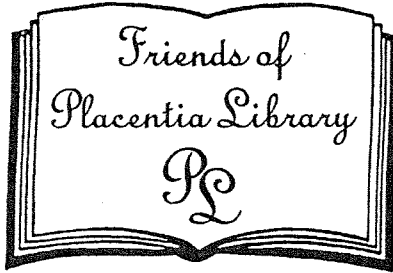

RE: HISTORY ROOM EXPANSION
REPORT

During a recent study session on this subject with the City Council, we were encouraged to develop our ideas and bring them back to the group in two months.

Discussion of History Room space needs had occurred with Elizabeth and with Al prior to the meeting with the City. We began to examine then very seriously how the History Room might better serve patrons now and in the future.

We, the History Room Committee, are currently working on a proposal for the City to consider funding. The Historical Committee is participating fully.

The H.R. Committee operates on the premise that materials relative to this city's history will be increasingly valued as groups within the city face significant anniversary dates. (i.e. Chamber of Commerce -75 years, Roundtable Women's Club -100 years). Within our community, there is no other entity attempting collection and organization of materials relative to the city, its people and its organizations.

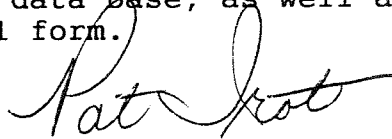
With the expansion proposed, we envision the existing space to be utilized by the patron with *interest* in local and state history. Book shelves within this room would be replaced by shelves built around the wall and comfortable, inviting furniture provided. The proposed additional space would provide the serious researcher with space, equipment and resources. This space would house two computer stations, a audio/video viewing station, file storage area and a work station for materials processing. (As of now, we volunteers are

processing materials, using space in competition with patron space usage.)

To gain information for the preparation of the proposal, visits are in progress to nearby libraries to determine how they serve their patrons. The observation runs from extensive efforts to capture local history to, in one instance, no effort at all.

Resourcefulness has been our byword. Some years ago, the papers of Samuel Kraemer were retrieved prior to the demolition of his home. Our efforts led to the acquisition of a architects' file cabinet to store large plat maps, etc. Students from CSUF have been sought with some success to do data entry.

I feel reinforced by the support of the Trustees, the staff and the expertise of the Historical Committee. We will, one day, have a valuable collection available to patrons, listed on a data base, as well as preserved in its original form.

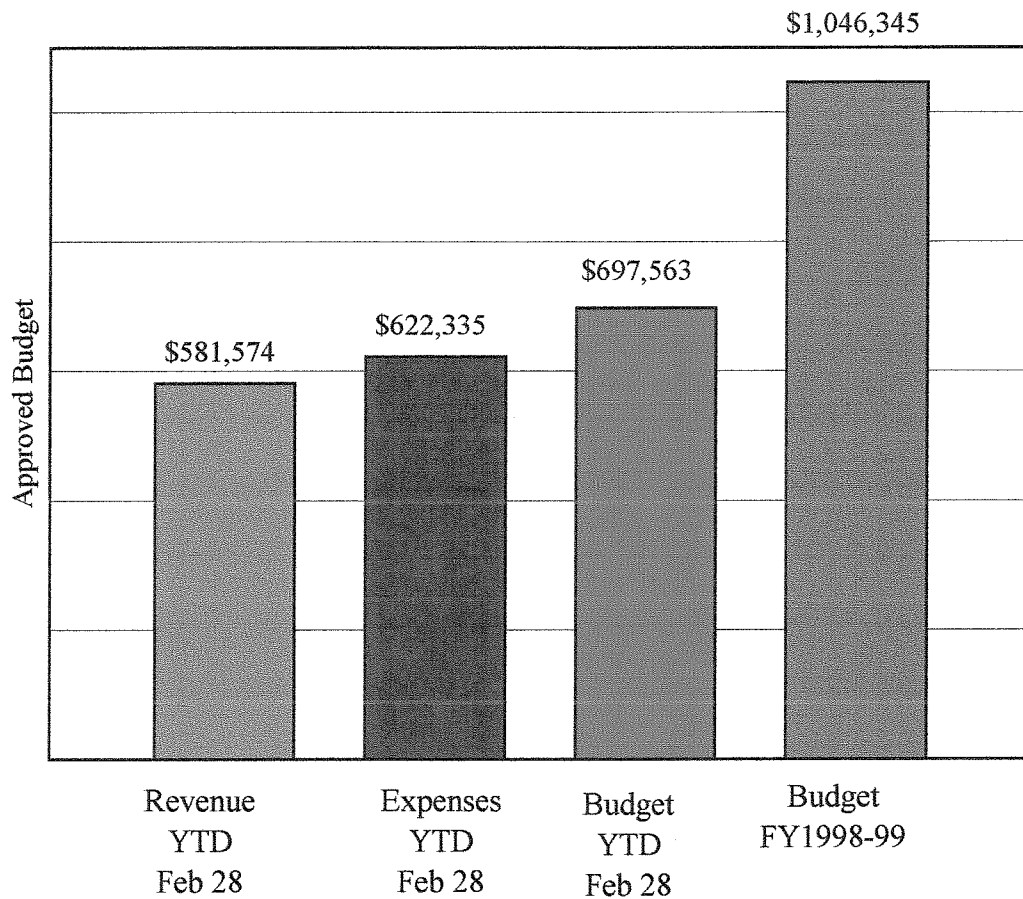

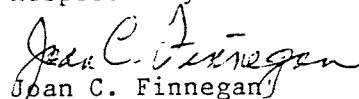

Subject: Local Government Finance Forum

Concerns over the uncertainty of local government financing, state mandates, and redevelopment and the fiscalization of land use were voiced Friday (Jan. 22) at a local government finance forum held in Los Angeles by the Senate Committee on Budget and Fiscal Review.

Committee Chairman Steve Peace (D-El Cajon) noted that he wasn't sure what the end result would be of this and five other forums scheduled around the state over the next two weeks. He did, however, note that pressures have been building to take a comprehensive look at state and local government financing and deal with it legislatively.

Dean Misczynski, Director of the California Research Bureau gave an overview of local government financing in the post-Prop. 13 era, followed by brief perspectives from Pat Leary of the County Supervisors Association of California (CSAC), David Jones of the League of California Cities and LA County Sanitation District Assistant General Manager Jim Stahl for the California Special Districts Association.

The next two-and-a-half hours were devoted to a roundtable discussion among 18 invited participants representing counties, cities and special districts.

Most of the discussion focused on city/county issues because, as Misczynski noted, understanding special districts and the differences between them, "is a little like decoding DNA."

Three overriding concerns were echoed by many of the participants:

- 1) Any tinkering with the current financing structure should start with a blank slate and not be burdened by the current structure;
- 2) The Legislature should reexamine the kinds of development incentives that flow from various financing options; and
- 3) Any new structure must acknowledge the tensions between state and local governments and account for differences between those who desire independence and those who cannot survive on their own.

Ron Deaton, chief legislative analyst for the City of Los Angeles noted that Prop. 13 passed because people wanted certainty in what they have to pay.

Peace himself expressed concern that the increasing dependence on sales taxes and user fees in lieu of property taxes means that Californians are losing a degree of deductibility on their federal income taxes. He said one way to correct this might be to return to a property tax base but increase the homeowners' exemption. Then, through deductions on federal income taxes, Californians might even see a net tax reduction.

Los Angeles County CEO David Janssen suggested reevaluating the financing of city redevelopment agencies, noting that "two billion dollars annually would be in the mix if not for redevelopment." But Brea Mayor Lynn Daucher countered that redevelopment "is the only local tool we have to do economic revitalization, and is a critical catalyst for growth."

Long Beach Councilman Ray Grabinski acknowledged he was envious of Daucher and cities like Brea, and he worried about how the current system fosters economic cannibalism. "I look with envy at cities like Brea that can take advantage of new opportunities instead of struggling with infrastructure problems like older cities."

Dawn Mittleman, a board member from the Valley of the Moon Fire Protection District (Sonoma County) noted that redevelopment in her area has increased by 50% the amount of property tax income to the district. "It's hurt us more than ERAF," she said, referring to the state-mandated shift of some property taxes to schools in 1992 and 1993.

Santa Barbara County Supervisor Naomi Schwartz worried about the strings and "wasteful" reporting requirements that are attached to state monies, noting that \$13 million of Santa Barbara's \$93 million social services budget is spent on reporting requirements. Schwartz suggested moving to a form of performance-based block grants, perhaps on a biannual cycle.

LA Sanitation District's Stahl said he was concerned about increasing costs imposed by state and federal regulations that don't come with money to implement them. Deaton suggested that rather than seek offsetting money, consumers should be made aware of the "true costs so they know what to complain about. Otherwise, you will never have them on your side when you want their help."

Senator Richard Polanco (D-Los Angeles), also attended the forum along with Sen. Cathie Wright (R-Simi Valley). Polanco said three issues raised during the discussions intrigued him:

- 1) The idea of "use it or lose it" when it comes to redevelopment funds;
- 2) Allowing counties more independence and flexibility that accrues to charter counties; and
- 3) Going to performance-based funding if we can deal with safety-net issues.

Topic: Local fiscal relief: property tax revenue allocation.

Last Action: Referred to Com. on L. GOV. (02/01/1999)

Digest Summary: Existing property tax law requires the county auditor, in each fiscal year, to allocate property tax revenues to local jurisdictions in accordance with specified formulas and procedures, and generally requires that each jurisdiction be allocated an amount equal to the total of the amount of revenue allocated to that jurisdiction in the prior fiscal year, subject to certain modifications, and that jurisdiction's portion of the annual tax increment, as defined.

This bill would, except as otherwise provided with respect to amounts attributable to community colleges, prohibit a county auditor, for the 1999-2000 fiscal year and each fiscal year thereafter, from allocating to that county's ERAF a total amount of ad valorem property tax revenue greater than the amount allocated from that fund to school districts and the county office of education for the 1998-99 fiscal year.

Senate Budget Committee Hearings: What's Next?

On February 8, 1999, the Senate Budget and Fiscal Review Committee conducted its sixth and final forum on local government finance in Merced. As with the previous forums, special districts were represented along with participants from cities and counties.

At the outset of the first forum in Los Angeles, Senate Budget and Fiscal Review Committee Chairman Steve Peace announced that the series of forums were intended to gather information relative to all aspects of local government finance. Senator Peace also indicated that the Committee was most interested in hearing from local officials regarding the current state of local government finance versus solutions, which he stated would be considered by the Committee following the conclusion of the six forums.

While the witnesses at each forum discussed a variety of local government finance issues, a number of themes surfaced, which are presented below.

Sales Tax Revenues/Planning Decisions

A growing number of legislators have become openly critical of development decisions by counties and cities. Due to the loss of property tax revenues, cities and counties have relied more and more on sales tax-generating developments, such as automobile malls. Numerous city and county witnesses suggested that the Committee reverse this trend by shifting property tax revenues back to cities and counties for a like amount of sales tax that would be shifted back to the State.

Property Tax Revenues for Property-Related Services

A second issue that was discussed at some length during the forums was the issue of designing a local government structure that would direct property tax revenues to property-related services. This is certainly not a new idea, but the focus was centered around the concept of designating property-related services and returning ERAF revenues to local governments to ensure they have adequate property tax revenues to provide these services.

Other Related Issues

Since the Committee's stated goal was to gather factual information regarding the current state of local government finance from the viewpoint of local officials, numerous other fiscal issues were raised at each forum.

ERAF, and the resulting loss of property tax revenues, was cited by virtually every witness at each forum. This discussion prompted the Committee to discuss the relationship of other "assistance" funding programs the Legislature has passed since the property tax shifts, which benefit primarily cities and counties.

Included in these "assistance" programs are Proposition 172 (sales tax for public safety) and the COPS program, which is a \$100 million State allocation for local law enforcement programs. This discussion related to a recent report issued by the State's Legislative Analyst, wherein she suggested that some local governments are actually net "winners" since the property tax shifts, due to revenues received from Proposition 172 and COPS.

What's Next

At the conclusion of the final forum in Merced, Chairman Peace announced that the Committee and its staff would review the information gathered during the hearings and determine what, if anything, can be accomplished this year. Conventional thinking is that any local government finance reform legislation considered this year will not reach final form until after the Department of Finance issues this year's May Revision.

With respect to the Legislative Analyst's report cited above, a more recent report by the Analyst concludes that the Governor's proposed 1999-2000 State Budget, that estimates a fiscal year deficit of \$2.3 billion, is overstated. The Analyst is now predicting the State should end this fiscal year with approximately \$1.3 billion in new revenues.

The Analyst's new revenue forecast may enable the Legislature to begin to address local government finance this year. While we cannot speculate the degree or form of any proposal that may be considered this year, there is growing support within the Legislature to cap the ERAF and allow local governments to retain the ERAF-growth that currently goes to schools. Current estimates place the cost of capping ERAF at somewhat less than \$200 million.

CSDA will continue to monitor the activities of the Senate Budget and Fiscal Review Committee and will advise our member districts of any new developments.

Senate Commerce Committee Holds Hearing on Children's Internet Protection Act, S. 97; Action Needed

On March 4 Sen. John McCain (R-AZ) chaired a hearing on filtering legislation that he and ranking minority member Sen. Ernest Hollings (D-SC) have proposed. The Children's Internet Protection Act, S. 97 (See ALAWON v8, n7, January 22, 1999) would "require the installation and use by schools and libraries of a technology for filtering or blocking material on the Internet on computers with Internet access to be eligible to receive or retain universal service assistance."

In his opening statement McCain said, "Schools and libraries, in subscribing to the E-rate program, assume the responsibility for providing a front-line protection policy for children who utilize their computers to access the Internet." While most witnesses agreed with McCain's sentiment, there were wide ranging opinions as to how and by whom these policies should be created and what they should include.

Sen. Conrad Burns (R-MT), the senator who offered the Acceptable Use Policy alternative to McCain's legislation last year, said

that he would be co-sponsoring S. 97. After expressing great concern that the First Amendment not be trampled in the process of battling child exposure to inappropriate materials on the Internet, he declared, "We will get this right."

Candace Morgan, associate director of the Fort Vancouver Regional Library (WA), testified that the bill, as currently framed, would deny local schools and libraries the opportunity to determine what approach would best serve children in their communities. "It is not just that one solution doesn't fit all communities," Morgan explained. "It is also that a federal mandate on a matter so closely tied to local norms and values is counterproductive and even harmful. The legislation may not only discourage communities from doing the hard work to reach their own solutions; it also lacks the legitimacy necessary to foster broad community support." Ms. Morgan's testimony can be viewed online at <http://www.ala.org/washoff/statements.html>.

Janie Harris, executive director of Solace House, pleaded with the Committee for the federal government to provide a "virtual seatbelt" for the Internet. Solace House is a center serving grieving children and their families in the Kansas City area of Kansas and Missouri. She said she would rather see computers turned off than have children be able to reach the type of material available on a Web site with a name very similar to Solace House.

Other witnesses included Mary Anne Layden, director of education, Department of Psychiatry, Center for Cognitive Therapy, University of Pennsylvania; Gordon Ross, president, Net Nanny; Bruce Taylor, president and chief counsel, National Law Center for Children and Families; Jay Sekulow, president, American Center for Law and Justice; Elliot Mincberg, vice president and general counsel, People for the American Way; and Adrian Russell-Falla, chairman, Rulespace.

ALA, together with a number of education organizations, filed a letter for the hearing record stating that decisions on how best to achieve safe, responsible, and appropriate Internet use by children are most appropriately made at the local level, not by federal mandate.

Action Needed:

Sen. McCain and some other members of the Committee appeared to believe that allowing librarians to select and configure filters that the federal government would require a library to install and use was enough of a concession to local control. Any library that has found value in a local policy planning process that may or may not have included filters should contact their Senators and share with them the steps being taken to serve, educate and protect the

young people who use their facilities.

Sen. McCain has promised to move this legislation quickly. If Senators are aware of librarians' efforts to address the very difficult issues surrounding children's use of the Internet it may help to preserve your library's ability to make choices about how to serve your community.

BYLAWS

DRAFT

OF THE

SPECIAL DISTRICT RISK MANAGEMENT AUTHORITY

THESE BYLAWS are for the regulation of the Special District Risk Management Authority (SDRMA).

ARTICLE I

MEMBERSHIP

- 1 Eligibility**
Any district or joint powers agency organized under the laws of the State of California, which is a member of the California Special Districts Association, alternately referred to as CSDA, is eligible for membership in SDRMA upon approval of its membership by the Board of Directors of SDRMA.
- 2 Participating Member**
A "participating member district" as that term is used herein is any public entity or joint powers agency described in (1) above, in the State of California whose participation in SDRMA has been approved by the Board of Directors; which is a member of the California Special Districts Association; and which has executed the Joint Powers Agreement or successor document of which these Bylaws are a part, and which participates in the Package Program.
- 3 Successor Member Entity**
Should any participating member reorganize in accordance with the statutes of the State of California, the successor in interest, or successors in interest, if a member of the California Special Districts Association, may be substituted as a participating member upon approval by the Board of Directors.
- 4 Admission Fee**
Upon joining, any district or other eligible agency approved for participation in SDRMA after the effective date of its coverage may be required to pay an admission fee in such amount as may be established by the Board of Directors.
- 5 Annual Membership Meeting**
An annual meeting of the members of the Authority shall be held at a time and place to be determined by the Board of Directors of the Authority. Each and every entity that is a member of the Authority thirty (30) calendar days before said annual meeting, shall receive written notice of the time, place and tentative agenda of the meeting no less than twenty (20) calendar days prior to such meeting. The annual meeting shall be conducted in accordance with policies established by the Board of Directors of the Authority.



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BYLAWS of the SPECIAL DISTRICT RISK MANAGEMENT AUTHORITY

ARTICLE II

BOARD OF DIRECTORS

DRAFT

1 Powers

Under the Joint Powers Agreement or successor document, the Special District Risk Management Authority is empowered to carry out all of its powers and functions through a Board of Directors. The Board of Directors shall have the following powers:

- (a) To exercise all powers to conduct all business of SDRMA.
- (b) To determine the details of and select joint protection program or programs to be offered by the Authority.
- (c) To purchase excess insurance, liability insurance, stop loss insurance, officers and directors liability insurance, and such other insurance as the Authority may deem necessary or proper to protect the program and its employees and participating members.
- (d) To defend, pay, compromise, adjust and settle all claims against member districts arising out of acts occurring during the period of coverage.
- (e) To fix and collect deposits from members.
- (f) To deposit all funds received in separate accounts in the name of the Special District Risk Management Authority.
- (g) To invest funds on hand in a manner authorized by law.
- (h) To expend funds of SDRMA only for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of the Joint Powers Agreement or successor document and these Bylaws.
- (i) To conduct audits at the expense of SDRMA of the business affairs of members in order to verify the proper computation of deposits.
- (j) To provide financial administration, claims management services, legal representations, safety engineering, actuarial services, and other services necessary or proper to carry out the purposes of SDRMA either through its own employees or contracts with one or more third parties.
- (k) To obtain a fidelity bond, in such amounts as the Authority may determine, for any person or persons who have charge of or the authority to expend funds of SDRMA.
- (l) To establish policies and procedures for the operation of SDRMA.
- (m) To enter into any and all contracts or agreements necessary or appropriate to carry out the purposes and functions of SDRMA.

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- (n) To acquire, hold, manage and dispose of, as provided by law, any and all personal property necessary or appropriate to carry out the purposes and functions of SDRMA.

2 Election and Appointment of Directors

- (a) The Board of Directors shall consist of one director appointed by the Board of Directors of the California Special Districts Association. Such appointee shall be from an SDRMA member entity that has executed the current operative Joint Powers Agreement and is participating in the joint protection program(s) offered by SDRMA and five directors elected by the members who have executed the current operative Joint Powers Agreement and are participating in one of the joint protection programs offered by SDRMA.
- (b) The election of directors shall take place at the annual meeting of the Authority held in each odd-numbered year.
- (c) Each participating member entity shall have one vote in the election of each director. ~~Members may cast votes by proxy, provided that an Authority To Cast Proxy Ballot, and an accompanying resolution of the Board of Directors of the Member Entity, are in the possession of SDRMA prior to the opening of its annual meeting.~~ The authorized representative from each member entity must be present at the election to cast the member's vote.
- (d) Each candidate for election as a director must be a member of the Board of Directors of a participating member, or a management employee, attorney, or consultant of a participating member. Nominations for the office of director may be made by any participating member. Only one representative from any member may serve on the Board of Directors at the same time.
- (e) Except as hereinafter provided, the term of office shall be for four years ending on December 31.
- (f) The terms of the Directors appointed by CSDA will end on December 31 of the alternate odd-numbered year to coincide with the two SDRMA elected Directors discussed below.

The terms of the five Directors elected by the members will be staggered. Three Directors will serve four-year terms, to end on December 31 of one odd-numbered year. Two Directors will serve four-year terms, to end on December 31 of the alternate odd-numbered year.

3 Vacancy

- (a) Upon the death or resignation of a member of the Board of Directors appointed by the Board of Directors of the California Special Districts Association, the vacancy shall be filled for the balance of the unexpired term by appointment by said Board of Directors of the California Special Districts Association.



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- (b) Upon the death or resignation of any other member of the Board of Directors, the vacancy shall be filled for the balance of the unexpired term by appointment by the remaining members of the Board of Directors of SDRMA.

4 Meetings

- (a) The business of the Board of Directors shall be conducted and exercised only at a regular or special meeting of the Board of Directors held in accordance with law.
- (b) Minutes of any and all meetings shall be available to members upon request. A synopsis of Board actions may be mailed or otherwise distributed to members not less frequently than quarterly.

5 Quorum and Required Vote

A quorum of at least four members of the Board of Directors must be present at any meeting before the business of the Board of Directors can be transacted. The vote of a majority of the Board of Directors shall be required for any act or decision of the Board of Directors except as otherwise specifically provided by law.

6 Expenses

CSDA will bear the total board meeting and committee meeting cost of their appointed representative in accordance with their respective policy(ies). Only those Board Members elected by SDRMA members or who are appointed by the SDRMA Board of Directors shall be reimbursed by SDRMA for all reasonable and necessary travel expenses when required or incurred by any director in connection with attendance at a meeting of the Board of Directors or a committee thereof and for such other expenses as are approved by the Board. These expenses shall include, but shall not be limited to, all charges for meals, lodging, air fare, and the costs of travel by automobile at a rate per mile established by the Board of Directors. CSDA's appointee will be reimbursed by SDRMA for all reasonable and necessary travel, lodging, meal and registration expenses when in attendance at an SDRMA Board approved training program or seminar.

ARTICLE III

OFFICERS

1 President, Vice President and Secretary

- (a) There shall be three officers: a president, a vice president and a secretary, who shall be members of the SDRMA Board of Directors.
- (b) Only those Directors that hold elective directorships shall be eligible to serve as officers. Those Directors who hold CSDA-appointed directorships shall not be eligible to serve as officers.
- (c) Elections shall be held at the first meeting following January 1 of each even numbered year and each officer's term shall begin thereafter, and shall end following adjournment of the first meeting following January 1 of the next even numbered year, or as soon thereafter as a successor is elected.



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- (d) In the event the president, vice president or secretary so elected ceases to be a member of the Board of Directors, the resulting vacancy in the office shall be filled by election at the next regular meeting of the Board of Directors after such vacancy occurs.
- (e) The president shall preside at and conduct all meetings of the Board of Directors, and shall carry out the resolutions and orders of the Board of Directors and shall exercise such other powers and perform such other duties as the Board of Directors shall prescribe. In the absence of the president, the vice president shall carry out the duties of the president. The secretary shall keep, or cause to be kept, minutes of all meetings, and shall have such other powers and perform such other duties as may be prescribed by the Board of Directors.

2

Executive Director/Risk Manager

The Special District Risk Management Authority shall appoint an Executive Director/Risk Manager who shall have general administrative responsibility for the activities of this joint powers authority and who shall be responsible for all minutes, notices, and records of meetings and shall perform such other duties as may be assigned by the Board of Directors. The executive director/risk manager shall be paid by the Special District Risk Management Authority.

ARTICLE IV

DESIGNATED ENTITY

1

The Lewiston Community Services District is hereby designated as the applicable entity for defining the restrictions upon the manner of exercising power as set forth in the California Government Code Section 6509, and as provided for in Paragraph (2) of the Joint Powers Agreement of which these Bylaws are a part.

2

Should the Lewiston Community Services District terminate its membership or be involuntarily terminated in accordance with provisions of these Bylaws, the Board of Directors shall, by resolution, name a successor community services district as the "designated entity" until such time as this Article can be amended in accordance with Article IX hereof.

ARTICLE V

JOINT PROTECTION PROGRAMS

1

Implementation of Joint Protection Programs

The Board of Directors may, at any time, offer such joint protection programs as it may deem desirable, other than workers' compensation coverage. Such joint protection program or programs shall be offered on such terms and conditions as the Board of Directors may determine. Members must participate in the Package Program, but participation in any other



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joint protection program or plan will be optional. The Board of Directors shall establish the amount of deposit or contribution, determine the amount of loss reserve contribution, provide for the handling of claims, determine the amount of excess insurance to be purchased, and otherwise establish the policies and procedures necessary to provide a particular joint protection program for participating members.

2 Method of Calculating Contributions

The method of calculating contributions for participating members in each joint protection program or plan shall be established annually by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE VI

FINANCIAL AFFAIRS

1 Accounts and Records

SDRMA shall establish and maintain such bank accounts and maintain such books and records as determined by the Board of Directors and as required by good accounting practice. Books and records of SDRMA shall be open to inspection at all reasonable times by authorized representatives of participating members. Periodically, but not less often than annually, financial reports shall be made available to all participating members.

2 Audit

SDRMA shall obtain an annual audit of its financial statements, which audit shall be made by an independent certified public accountant and shall conform to generally accepted auditing standards. A copy of said audit report shall be available, upon request, to each of the participating members. Such audit report shall be obtained and filed within six months after the end of the fiscal year under examination.

3 Risk Sharing

Any joint protection program established and/or operated under these Bylaws are intended to be risk sharing programs. Notwithstanding this intention, and upon findings by the Board of Directors of the Authority that confirm the value thereof, the Board of Directors may recognize sound risk management and loss control by the members through contribution modifications.

4 Distribution of Risk Margin

Any risk margin from the operation of any joint protection program may be distributed to the participating members in such joint protection program under such terms and conditions as may be determined by the Board of Directors, but any such distribution shall be made on a prorata basis in relation to gross contributions paid to that program and shall be made only to those members which participated in the program during the coverage year in which the risk margin was generated.

5 Assessments

(a) If, in the opinion of the Board of Directors, claims against participating member in any particular program or plan for any particular program year are of such a



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magnitude as to endanger the ability of SDRMA to continue to meet its obligations for that program year, each member who has participated in that particular program or plan of SDRMA during the applicable program year shall be assessed by SDRMA a prorata share of the additional amount determined necessary by the Board of Directors to restore the ability of SDRMA to continue to meet its obligations for the applicable program year.

- (b) Each member's prorata share of the total assessment shall be in the same proportion as that member's gross contributions paid during or due for the applicable program year bears to the total gross contributions paid by or due from all participating members during the applicable program year. In calculating these amounts, the assessment shall not be included in gross contributions.
- (c) Failure of any participating member to pay any regular contribution or assessment when due shall be cause for the involuntary termination of that entity's membership in SDRMA. Such assessment shall be a debt due by all members who have participated in the applicable SDRMA program or plan during the applicable program year, and shall not be discharged by termination of membership.

6

Fiscal Year

SDRMA shall operate on a fiscal year commencing on July 1 and ending on the following June 30. Such fiscal year shall also be the coverage year or program year for any member in any joint protection program.

ARTICLE VII

TERMINATION OF MEMBERSHIP

1

Withdrawal

Any participating member may voluntarily withdraw from any particular joint protection program in accordance with the applicable provision of the Joint Powers Agreement or any successor document thereto.

2

Involuntary Termination

A participating member may be involuntarily terminated only for any of the following reasons:

- (a) Failure to pay any contribution, deposit, contribution to loss reserve, or assessment when due.
- (b) Failure to comply with the Bylaws or with the policies and procedures established by SDRMA.
- (c) Failure to sign any properly adopted amendment to the then operative Joint Powers Agreement or successor document when requested to do so.

- (d) Failure to maintain membership in the California Special Districts Association.
- (e) Dissolution of a participating member entity.

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3 Payment Upon Termination of Membership

In the event of a termination of the membership of any participating member by involuntary termination, said member shall thereafter be entitled to receive its prorata share of any distribution of risk margin declared by the Board of Directors that pertains to a coverage year during which the terminated member participated in any particular program of SDRMA for which such distribution is made. Such payment shall be in full settlement and satisfaction of any and all claims that said terminated member may have against SDRMA.

No member that voluntarily withdraws shall be entitled to any refund of contributions, deposits, loss reserve contribution, risk margin, or return of assessment, unless otherwise approved by the SDRMA Board of Directors.

4 Continued Liability

Upon withdrawal or involuntary termination of a participating member, that member shall continue to be responsible for any unpaid deposits or contributions and for any assessment(s) levied in accordance with the provisions of these Bylaws.

ARTICLE VIII

TERMINATION OF SDRMA

Upon the termination of SDRMA, provision shall be made for the payment of all known claims; for insuring, reinsuring, or making other provision for the payment of any and all unknown claims covered by any protection program provided by SDRMA to a member and occurring during its period of participation in SDRMA; and for the payment of all debts, liabilities, administrative expenses, and obligations of SDRMA. After having paid or made provision for all such matters, SDRMA shall pay to each member of SDRMA at the time of SDRMA's termination, its prorata share of the remaining assets of SDRMA. A member's prorata share shall be in the same proportion as the total gross contributions, deposits and assessments paid by that member to SDRMA during its period of participation bears to the total gross contributions, deposits and assessments paid to SDRMA during its period of operation by all entities who are members of SDRMA at the time of termination.

ARTICLE IX

AMENDMENTS

These Bylaws may be amended at any time by majority vote of the Board of Directors following a 30-day written notice to all participating members and to CSDA as to the amendment(s) proposed to be adopted, except that these Bylaws cannot be amended in any way that would conflict with the terms and provisions of the Joint Powers Agreement or successor document and any amendment thereof.

I am writing in regard to the Proposed Bylaw Amendment concerning proxy voting. I concur with the proposal to do away with proxy voting and feel that this is a change which will make participation in elections easier and more attractive for the members. The proposed addition to the bylaws, however, appears to have exactly the opposite effect and certainly doesn't accomplish the six objectives laid out in your letter of February 10, 1999.

Since California is a very large state, it is impossible to schedule a meeting anywhere within the state which would be convenient to all of the member agencies. As a result, actual attendance at Statewide meetings will always represent only a portion of the membership. Although not explicitly stated in the February 10th letter, it is understood that future elections are intended to be conducted only at the Northern California Meetings. If this is the case, it will obviously make attendance more difficult to members in the southern portion of the state. It would seem that the greatest participation in an election could be derived from a simple mail-in ballot. Numerous other statewide (and nationwide) organizations do this. Allowing candidates to submit a photo and short statement of qualifications is not significantly less informative than seeing them in person and hearing them speak for a couple of minutes at the election.

If it is the desire of the Board to achieve maximum participation in the election with minimum inconvenience to the membership, it is recommended that this approach be seriously considered.

BACKGROUND:

Library Revenue Issues

At its Meeting on April 15, 1997, the Board requested that an item for the discussion of Library Revenue Issues be included on each Agenda.

1. Property Tax

Library Director Minter attended the California Special Districts Association (CSDA) Legislative Committee meeting in Sacramento on March 4, 1999. Lobbyist Ralph Heim reported on a meeting that he had with Assemblyman John Longville (R., San Bernadino County), newly appointed Chair of the Assembly Local Government Committee. Assemblyman Longville told Mr. Heim that he does not like special districts, that there is no need for special districts, that special districts should be taken off LAFCOs, and that next year he intends to introduce a bill to simplify local government that will include no role for special districts. There are no Orange County legislators on the Assembly Local Government Committee this year.

The next CSDA Legislative Committee Meeting is scheduled for early April.

California Advocates Lobbyist Mike Belote reported that he discussed the District's proposal of capping the ERAF shift for library districts at 20 or 25% with Senate Local Government Committee Chairman Richard Rainey (R, Contra Costa County). Senator Rainey was not enthusiastic about the idea. Senator Rainey suggested that the District utilize a parcel tax measure to replace the lost funds. There are no Orange County legislators on the Senate Local Government Committee this year.

2. State Funds

Letters have been sent to each member of the Senate Budget Subcommittee No. 1 on Education Finance (Attachment A) and the Assembly Budget Subcommittee No. 2 on Education Finance (Attachment B) requesting full funding of the Public Library Foundation program. California Advocates and CSDA have also been asked to write letters in support.

The Public Library Fund for Fiscal Year 1998-99 was received this month in the amount of \$59,146. Full funding would have been \$103,831.

3. Local Revenues

The Library Director continues to work with the City Manager on the list of funding items to be presented to the City Council.

Parcel Tax Election Considerations

I am writing to you on behalf of the Board of Directors of Placentia Library District to request the support of the Senate Budget Subcommittee No. 1 on Education Finance for full funding of the Public Library Foundation item in the State Budget.

As an independent special district Placentia Library lost 50.41% of its property tax revenue during the 1992-93 and 1993-94 ERAF shifts. Property tax is the District's sole tax source for operating revenue and none has been restored since those shifts. The result has been a deterioration in local public library services as the Library's hours were reduced from 64 to 39 per week, its staff reduced from 24 full time equivalents to 12, and its book budget reduced from over \$150,000 to approximately \$60,000.

Placentia Library District uses 100% of its Public Library Foundation Fund allocation to finance its book budget. Full funding of the PLF Fund would increase Placentia's allocation from \$59,146 to \$103,831. BACKGROUND:

Placentia Library District changed from purchasing its liability insurance from a commercial insurance carrier to the Special District Risk Management Authority in July 1996. At that time the District made a commitment to remain with the joint powers authority pool for a minimum of three years. That time period expires at the end of the current contract year.

The reason that the District joined SDRMA was to provide greater stability to the cost of liability insurance. In periods of great market fluctuation the self-insured pool offers reasonably stable premiums. SDRMA is a non-profit organization formed by its members for the sole purpose of providing liability insurance. The District has saved a great deal of money by being a member of SDRMA and has also benefited from the training and inspection programs offered as member benefits by SDRMA.

The District has been approached by a commercial liability insurance carrier, Coregis, and is being asked to drop its affiliation with SDRMA. Coregis has an exceptionally aggressive marketing program and it is actively pursuing all SDRMA members.

The District's cost for SDRMA for Fiscal Year 1998-99 was \$10,124.25, which included a small surcharge for semi-annual payments. Coregis is proposing a premium of \$7,192, see Attachment A, that may also include a requirement of paying membership dues to the California Rural Water Association (CRWA), the sponsoring organization. Coregis is a commercial carrier and is thus not a membership organization. Coregis is requiring a three-year membership commitment.

The renewal rates for SDRMA will not be available until the end of April. Yet if a District wishes to withdraw from SDRMA it is required to give notice by the end of March. SDRMA staff estimates that the SDRMA Board will be able to offer renewal rates that are competitive with Coregis.

Changing liability insurance carriers is something that takes a large amount of administrative time. Libraries have special liability insurance needs that are fairly unique. It would be unwise to select a new carrier that is not willing to provide the replacement cost policies that the District needs for its book collection. Coregis' proposal is definitely geared to Districts with heavy equipment and outdoor activities – there is nothing to indicate that they are dealing with public service agencies. I asked the Coregis representative for a list of libraries insured by them and

there are none. SDRMA is now insuring over half of the independent special library districts in California.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

1. Receive & File the proposal from Calco Insurance Brokers for Fiscal Year 1999-2000 coverage on behalf of Coregis.
2. Instruct staff to give the Board a report in May that compares the Coregis and SDRMA proposals for Fiscal Year 1999-2000.
3. Defer deciding on whether to leave SDRMA until February 2000.

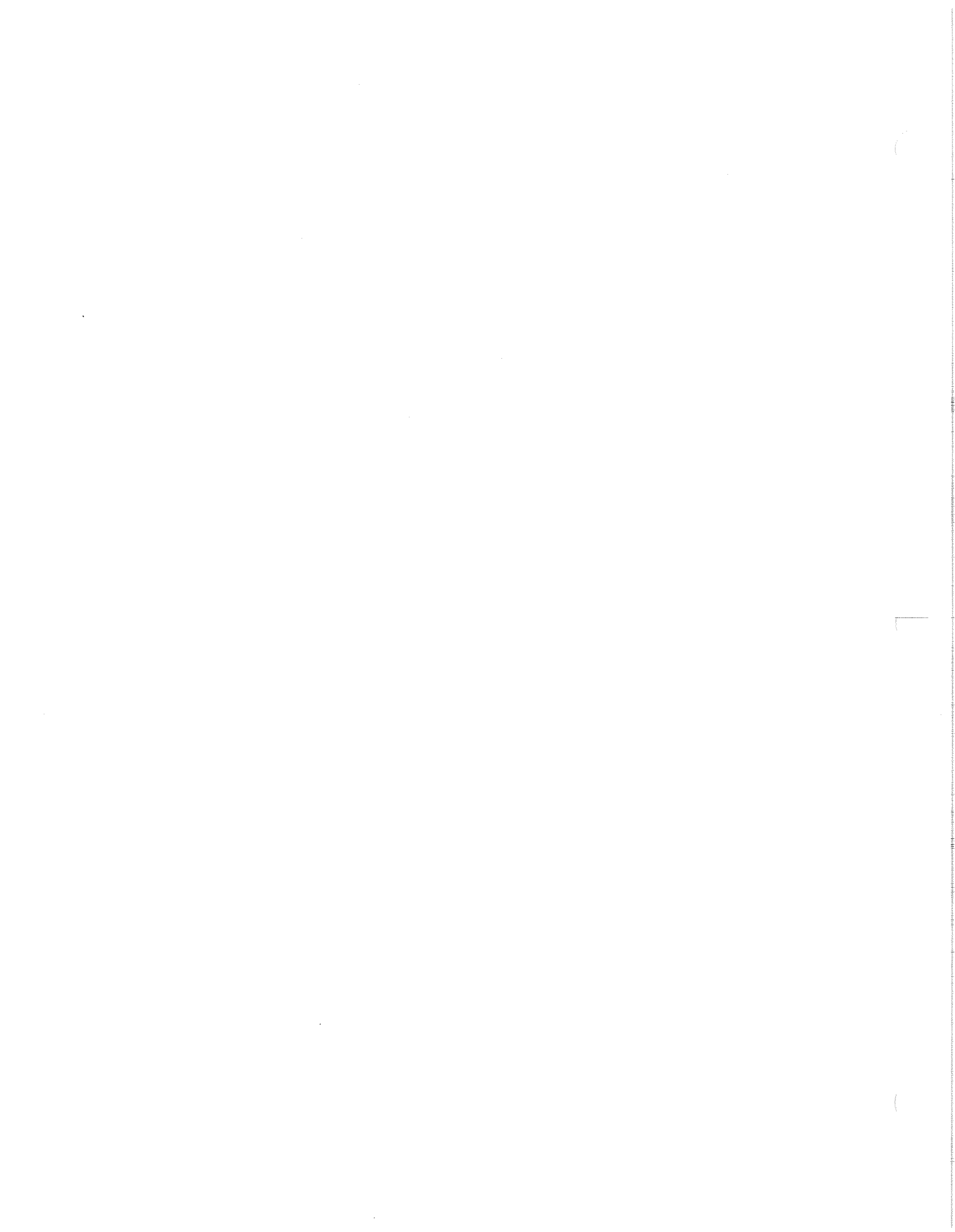
Class/Group visits- Class visits from local schools continued. 3 classes visited the library this month, with a total of 73 children using the library and it's services.

Special Programs- Sunday February 7th saw the start of our week long "Random Acts of Reading Week" in celebration of National Random Acts of Kindness Week. Teen and adult volunteers from the community were available in the storytime room afternoons and evenings to read to children on a drop-in basis. Over the course of 4 days (11 hours) 30 children took advantage of our volunteers for a quick story.

Summer Reading Program- Plans for the Summer Reading Program are under way. Five performers have been booked for the Way Out Wednesday programs. We will be having a storyteller, a comic magician, a presentation about sea otters, a musical performance, and a reenactment of a medieval troubadour troupe.

Community Sponsored Programs- The In-N-Out Burger reading program "Feed Your Imagination" continued through February. This program encourages children to read by awarding a bookmark that can be redeemed for a burger, fries, and drink for each set of 5 books read. Children can earn up to three bookmarks each. By the end of February a total of 320 children had been registered. 113 children had completed at least 1 bookmark, and 27 children had completed all three bookmarks.

Other Events- In February the Children's Librarian co-chaired the Santiago Library System's spring workshop on crafts. The workshop was held at the Yorba Linda Public Library, and featured craft demonstrations from several community businesses, and display tables from each of the SLS member libraries. Placentia's children's librarian arranged for performers, put together a display table, and created a bibliography of craft related web sites for the workshop. Attendance at the workshop was high, with over 60 librarians from the area attending.

City works for better library service

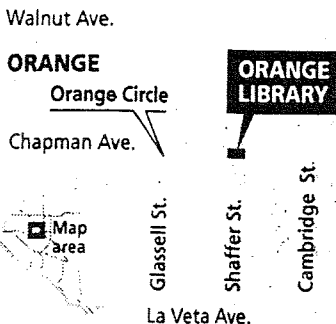
ORANGE — The \$1.7 million, 13-month renovation of the city's main library is a sign that better library service has become a priority for Orange, officials say.

But officials say the city is continuing to seek ways to expand the facility, still the smallest in the county. The main library and two smaller branches serve about 125,000 residents.

Q. How does renovation without expansion improve library services?

A. "We would like to have built a new, expanded library, but it would cost \$22 million or more," said Carolyn Cavecche, chairwoman of the library board of trustees. "The reconfiguration has made for the best use of space," she said.

The staff has consolidated its operations, centralizing resources and freeing about 1,000 square feet for a children's reading room and a new, expandable technology center.



New technology allows patrons to reserve and renew books from home.

"People in Orange had gotten used to below-par library services," Cavecche said. "We hope this renovation will spark people's interest in raising money to build an expanded library."

Q. What ideas are being explored for future expansion?

A. There is no timetable for when the library will expand, said Gary Wann, director of li-

brary services. The city still needs to assess the community's needs and determine how and where to expand.

The city purchased the Bank of America building on Center Street across from the library in 1997, and is using it for library storage and parking. It's the most likely site for expansion of the main library, Wann said.

Q. With more population growth occurring in the eastern part of Orange, does it make sense to have the main library in the west?

A. "There's been a lot of debate about that," Cavecche said. "The honest answer is, we don't know until we assess the community's needs whether we should expand the main library, relocate it or open more branches."

Librarians Are Not Cops

Public librarians, long the object of bad jokes about their alleged prudishness, now find themselves reluctant cops in a new war over pornography.

Libraries across the country have enthusiastically embraced the Internet. The 500 terminals in the 68 branches of the Los Angeles Public Library, for example, allow patrons to move beyond book and periodical collections in ways unimaginable just a decade ago.

But in addition to valuable online research tools, the Internet offers easy access to a deluge of pornographic material, something libraries have not had to contend with before. So pervasive are these sites that typing in even such innocuous search terms as "girl" or "pony" or "Bambi" can link children to images their parents understandably find scandalously shocking.

Sometimes the search is intentional. Last summer, in the Northern California community of Livermore, a 12-year-old boy downloaded dozens of sexually explicit images from an Internet hookup at his local library, printed the pictures and showed them at school. His mother sued the library for al-

lowing her son access to obscene material. Last week a state court denied her claim that the library violated the boy's constitutional right to a safe place.

Yet librarians, parents and lawmakers continue to face troubling questions about whether or how to limit access to pornographic material in public libraries, whose varied collections and open access attest to the value this nation places on free speech.

There are few good solutions. Congressional efforts to restrict the content of commercial Internet sites have failed early constitutional tests. Libraries are experimenting with sign-up sheets, positioning terminals in plain view of library staff and software that makes it more difficult for patrons to access obscene material. Each approach has limitations. As far as children are concerned, the best solution, though still imperfect, is for parents to monitor their Internet travels, at home and in the library. Parents have the right and responsibility to decide which television shows their children watch and what books they are ready to read. The Internet is no different.

Libraries Struggle in New Role as After-School Child-Care Centers

Upstairs at the San Marino Public Library, barely visible among the narrow, aging aisles, Max leans against a wooden bench. Books, friends and backpacks are sprawled around him.

Max, who is barely 4 feet tall, says he is 11 years old. He wears baggy jeans and a designer shirt and looks like every librarian's dream: a book worm gnawing his way through the stacks every day after school. Looks can be deceiving. Max is not here

thing of the past.

Librarians complain that this does not solve the child care problem; it merely passes it on to them.

"We aren't baby-sitters," said Terri Maguire, South Pasadena's city librarian. "We don't provide day care. We aren't responsible for the children."

The parents who fail to heed Maguire's words are leaving librarians with a painful dilemma: spend scarce resources to accommodate the children or limit their access.

Tired of seeing children left alone after library closing time, or just too young to be left alone at all, some libraries are reluctantly beginning to penalize parents.

From Massachusetts to California, they have begun enforcing a minimum age for unsupervised children. Some libraries call police if parents do not appear within 15 minutes of closing. San Marino, one of Los Angeles County's oldest old-money suburbs, votes tonight on an ordinance that would make it one of the first cities in the country to fine parents whose children are left alone outside at closing time.

"Some of the people [who work at the library] are having to choose between being late for their own children and waiting for the parents to arrive," San Marino City Manager Deborah Bell said.

Library officials in Orange County say they have few such

employees a monitor—a kind of child-watcher—and offers 400 programs a year for children.

She said the problem in South Pasadena pales in comparison to that in Palmdale, where she worked until last year. "We had kids whose parents were two hours away in L.A. One time I looked up and there was a boy swinging on the outside of the staircase."

"Both my parents work, so I have to come here every day after school," he says.

Every librarian knows a Max, maybe dozens of Maxes. He's a national epidemic.

Each day, thousands of children, some as young as 4, are left unattended at public libraries across the country.

As more and more parents find themselves trapped in the child care quandary, the local library is becoming one of the paths out of it.

Old rules have been tossed overboard as the wave of latchkey children swamps these sometimes frail old institutions—places that, a generation ago, seemed likely to be bypassed in the rush of the Information Age. Some libraries are so crowded today that there are not enough chairs. Children slump on the floors. Silence is a

problems. "But once in a while, parents get their signals crossed and we'll have an unattended child at library closing time with no way home," County Librarian John Adams said.

Twice in the past year libraries have called the Orange County Sheriff's Department to safeguard children until their parents were located, Adams said.

At Long Beach's 11 branch libraries, parents obtaining a library card for a child must pledge not to leave a child under 10 in the library unsupervised.

And in South Pasadena, a new sign on the door of the city's small, two-story library proclaims: "Attention Parents: Children Under the Age of 11 Must Be Accompanied by an Adult Over the Age of 18."

For a decade, South Pasadena had a rule saying that no one younger than 13 should be alone in the library, but it was never enforced. Things got so bad last September that the library board lowered the age to 11 with stricter enforcement and the sign.

"A library isn't a safe haven. Anyone can come in a library, and I mean anyone," Maguire said. "Parents would never think of dropping an 8-year-old off at the mall alone."

Maguire said the sign has encouraged a few parents to come inside with their children. South Pasadena, like many libraries, em-

You would hardly expect Indiana's Bloomfield-Eastern Greene County Public Library, which serves a community of 2,500, to be similarly plagued. But when children started getting left there for several hours a day last summer, officials reacted by drawing up a policy saying that no child younger than 11 should be there alone.

"We're a small town, but young

kids shouldn't be left alone for several hours," children's librarian Linda Peterson said. Some libraries see no choice but to serve the children, regardless of why they're there. Many librarians say that they have a duty to pick up the slack in communities where child care options are limited.

"We feel the public library is a place for people of all ages," said Penny Markey, Los Angeles County Library children's services coordinator, who believes policies to keep out unsupervised children are unenforceable.

In 20 of Los Angeles County's 87 branch libraries, afternoon homework centers work with latchkey children. "We have 1,000 children daily with nowhere else to go," Markey said.

At Los Angeles city libraries, a special program trains volunteer grandparents to read to children who are alone. Similar programs exist across the nation.

The New York Public Library, for example, offers 30,000 programs for children each year, said Caroline Oyama, manager of public relations.

"We have a lot of unattended children," Oyama said "Every librarian has a story of a young kid left when the library closes. But we want children in our libraries."

In New York's East Harlem, as many as 200 unattended children a day head to the Aguilar branch of the library, where there is seating for fewer than half of them, according to staff. It is a branch surrounded by 46 public schools

Arcadia Librarian Kent Ross. He said librarians are not trained care providers and have no legal control over children. Arcadia's large, spacious library plays host to hundreds of children daily. In some cubbyholes, youngsters finish up homework assignments while others nap or talk. Parents are few and far between.

Teenage boys in the computer room are on the Internet. Outside, young girls run around the parking lot.

Amey complains that she is bored but has to stay until 5:30 p.m. when her mother gets home.

Children, of course, have for

and numerous housing projects.

"Thousands of kids go to the library after school because cut-backs have meant there [are very few] programs for youths," Oyama said.

Many latchkey children are not readily identifiable until something happens to draw attention to them, Los Angeles library coordinator Markey said. Still, staffers know them by sight if not by name. At some libraries, whole families of latchkey children are regulars, young siblings in the care of older brothers or sisters who are barely teenagers themselves.

"We had one situation with four children, where the oldest one was 8 and the youngest 4, who would come regularly. We finally had to get the police to get the parents to understand," said Linda Wilson, Monterey Park city librarian. "An 8-year-old is not old enough to care for other children."

Wilson's library is so busy that the city is building another floor.

Many libraries cope by expanding. A smaller number—roughly estimated at 25%—are imposing new age rules. Many others, fearing potential liabilities, adopt a kind of "don't ask, don't tell" policy. They avoid introducing programs or policies even acknowledging the unsupervised children.

"If you adopt a policy, you're saying you are going to do something and you've got to keep that promise, and I am reluctant to promise any sort of service," said

decades gone to the library after school. But an increasing number of those without supervision are far from model students prepared to abide by the rules.

Silence no longer prevails.

In San Marino, children from the neighboring middle and elementary schools make up the vast majority of users. More than 100 a day flock to the library, a circular 1951 piece of architecture with the acoustics of an aircraft hangar.

Irene McDermott, San Marino's reference librarian, knows the latchkey children by sight. There are some days, she said, particularly when the weather is bad, when it can be hard to find a seat. The noise level is high. "We don't shush kids anymore," said McDermott. "Some of our older users are quite shocked to find children talking."

As McDermott speaks, a few feet away a boy and girl giggle over a book. A teenage girl flips open a cellular phone and begins a conversation. Others read. They chat. They eat.

Small groups sit outside waiting for parents.

Far from all the controversy, up in the second-floor stacks, there is evidence of at least one clear benefit arising out of this mess.

At least now, Max said, he gets his homework done.

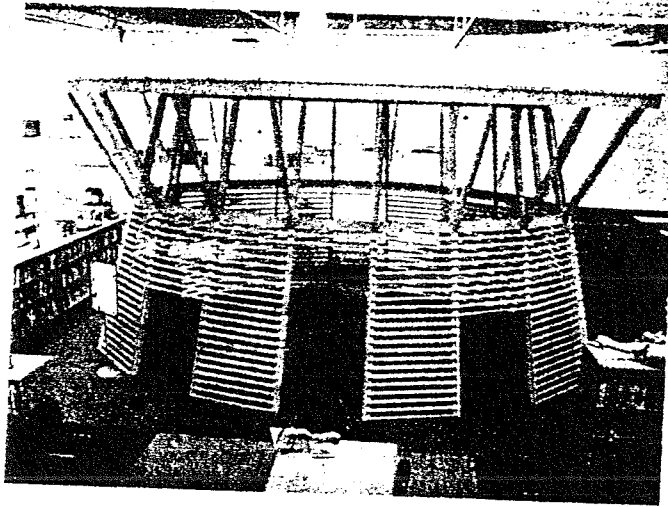
