
SUBJECT: Literacy Volunteers of America Board Report

The LVA-Placentia Board of Directors canceled their April meeting due to vacation schedules. The next Board meeting is scheduled for Thursday, June 17, at 6:00 PM.

A special meeting of interested LVA Directors and Placentia Library District staff was held May 10 to discuss the respective roles of LVA-Placentia and Placentia Library District, and goals for the literacy program. The group recognized four goals as most important: serving more learners and tutors, clarifying the roles of LVA-Placentia and Placentia Library District, expanding the funding sources for the program, and increasing cooperation and interaction with the community.

The state office of Literacy Volunteers of America closed its office in April due to financial limitations. LVA National has contracted with Brenda Gray in the north and Evey Renner in the south to provide interim field services to California affiliates a total of three days per month. LVA President Jinx Crouch met with affiliate representatives on Friday, May 7, at 7:00 PM to discuss the relationship between local programs and LVA National in light of the state office closure.

LVA National conducted a two day 50/50 Program Management training in Santa Ana on the weekend of April 24-25. Leslie Moreau attended as LVA-Placentia President and Melanie Daniels attended in her role as a V.I.T.A. (Volunteer in Technical Assistance) for LVA-CA.

I talked with Mike Belote, California Advocates at 10:00 A.M. today.

He reported that with the election of Assemblyman Farr to the U.S. Congress this week that Assemblyman Gotch is now the lead on the consolidate issues (LAFCO).

Gotch's work group report to the Assembly Says and Means Committee was made at 5:30 P.M. Wednesday. His group will support a property tax shift from local government of approximately \$1.3 billion. His group is also recommending full implementation of the Legislative Analyst's Office recommendation which includes "superpot" and consolidation/elimination of independent special districts.

Mr. Belote's personal projections are:

- 1) Property tax shift for local government of approximately \$1.3 billion.
- 2) No superpot unless the frustration level at the Capitol forces the issue.
- 3) AB8 funds will be taken before "historical" property tax.
- 4) Enterprise districts will be hit harder since most escaped the full intended hit last year.

SUBJECT:

FY1993-1994 Budget Assumptions

Part of the budget preparation process is the development of assumptions that drive the budget preparation decisions.

In times of cutbacks these assumptions become especially important as they identify priorities for services and programs.

I am recommending the following assumptions for the FY1993-1994 Budget:

- 1. That the State Budget will reduce local revenues at least the same amount as last year (\$128,000); with a strong likelihood of double last years amount (\$265,000); and a possibility of four times last year's amount (\$512,000).
- 2. That given the magnitude of the reduction in property tax revenue that significant cuts in personnel and hours of service will need to be made no later than July 1, 1993.
- 3. That additional reductions in staff and hours of service will be made as necessary when the final budget is known.
- 4. That reserve funds will be used to finance the debt service of \$71,800 but will not be used for general operating expenses.
- 5. That if the retirement incentive program is offered again it will be financed through reserve funds.
- 6. That reductions in public service hours will be made in reverse order of the library's busiest times of public use -- that is, the least busiest times are reduced first.
- 7. That the Library Board will address only issues of positions to be eliminated and personnel policies and will not address the issues of establishment of seniority for individuals or the politics of "bumping".

BUDGET ALERT

The Assembly Committee on Ways and Means passed two versions of the State Budget yesterday; one with the 1/2 cent sales tax and one without. The 1/2 cent is scheduled to expire on June 30, 1993, and if it is allowed to expire, would add \$1.5 billion to the growing deficit.

Both versions of these proposed Budgets include shifting the entire \$2.6 billion of local agency property tax revenues as proposed by Governor Wilson. While specific details are not yet clear, we believe the proposals would shift \$590 million from non-enterprise special districts and \$150 million from enterprise special districts. The \$590 million includes \$200 million, which is the shortfall from the 1992-93 35%-10% formula that was to have raised \$375 million.

Additionally, we understand that there will be no exclusions or exemptions, including debt service or multi-county special districts.

We understand that these proposals will be on the Assembly Floor next week, either Monday or Tuesday. Given the shortness of time, you need to contact your Assembly member as soon as possible and urge them to vote against the property tax shift element of these Budget proposals.

The Governor is encouraging the Assembly Republicans to support the shift, which coupled with Democrats that have already indicated their support, could provide sufficient votes to pass these measures to the Senate.

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

SECOND READING AS COMPARED TO THE FIRST READING

The Second Reading of the 1993/94 budget has incorporated, effective July 16, 1993, the revenue and expenditure assumptions related to Modules I, II, III, and V. Module I includes the closure of the branches, with associated staff, materials, supplies, and processing reductions. Module II includes non-public support staff reductions. Module III includes the elimination of Sunday hours at Peninsula Center. Module V includes an additional reduction of eleven (11) hours at Peninsula Center. The net savings of these four modules is \$464,131 on an annual basis and \$444,792 with an effective date of July 16, 1993. Included in the Second Reading are further reductions in library materials, professional development, public relations, maintenance, library supplies and the Los Angeles County tax collection fee as well as reductions in the property tax estimate. The impact of all these changes is summarized in Attachment C.

As shown on the attached budget summary, the Second Reading of the 1993/94 Budget is a deficit budget which reduces the fund balance by \$44,655. This fund balance will still be adequate to provide for the District's July through December cash requirements.

SECOND READING AS COMPARED TO 1992/93 BUDGET

Revenues

Overall, total revenues are budgeted in the Second Reading of the 1993/94 budget at \$2,659,905, a decrease of \$1,024,783 or 28%, from the approved 1992/93 budget. Property taxes are budgeted at \$2,342,446, a decrease of \$987,568 or 30% from the

approved 1992/93 budget. Contributing to the decline in property tax revenues are three factors: (1) the continuation of the State capture of 10% of our reported 1990/91 total revenues which amounts to \$402,795, an increase of \$58,853 from 1992/93; (2) the assumption that AB 8 will be repealed which would result in an additional loss of District revenue to the State estimated at \$352,984; and (3) the assumption that SDAF will be discontinued due to the repeal of AB B resulting in the elimination of the SDAF distribution which in 1992/93 amounted to \$664,103.

In addition, the rate of increase in the assessed valuation of property has dropped. We are estimating a 2.5% increase in secured/unsecured assessed valuations for the District in fiscal year 1993/94. This estimated assessed valuation increase compares to the 2.65% increase being estimated by the Los Angeles County in preparing its 1993/94 budget. In 1992/93, the rate of increase was 6.1%.

Property tax revenues have been reduced \$1,591,651 or 40% when compared to the 1991/92 actual -- just two years ago.

Internal income is budgeted at \$264,289, a decrease of \$9,347 or 3%, from the approved 1992/93 budget. The main reason for this decrease is the projected loss of internally generated revenue related to the proposed closing of the branches and reduction of Peninsula Center hours coupled with the assumption that we no longer will be receiving \$15,588 in CLSA funds from the State. Fines and fees increases, approved by the Library Board effective January 1, 1993, partially offset these reductions.

Interest income is budgeted at the same amount as 1992/93. We are assuming that the earnings rate will continue at slightly under 4%.

Public Library Fund (PLF) monies have not been budgeted in 1993/94. We cannot meet the current Maintenance of Effort requirement for these funds because of the previous reductions in the materials budget.

Expenditures

Total expenditures are budgeted at \$2,704,560, a reduction of \$980,078 or 27%, from the approved 1992/93 budget. A large amount of this reduction (\$566,376) is that we are not budgeting any transfers to the Building Fund or to the Asset Replacement Fund. Overall, operating expenditures are lower than the 1992/93 budget by \$413,702, or 13%. This reduction is entirely due the implementation of service reductions amounting to \$489,646 at all three locations of the District offset by the budgeting of \$72,150 for the November 1993 Trustee election.

Salary and Related Accounts

Total Salary and Related expenditures are budgeted at \$1,662,880, a reduction of \$343,034 or 17%, from the approved 1992/93 budget. Salary and related costs continue to be 61% of total operating costs.

Budgeted Salary and Related costs are based on projected salaries, including scheduled step raises amounting to an overall 1.3% increase. The Second Reading incorporates the recent agreement with the employee association. This provides no increase in cost-of-living for the term of the two year contract. There are no changes in benefits for the employee. However, the District has agreed to pay any increases in the cost of the HMO plan during the contract period so that the employee contribution does not change.

The 1993/94 salary budget includes the impact of the twelve (12) frozen positions resulting from attrition during 1992/93 as well as the twenty-four (24) positions resulting from the implementation of Modules I, II, III, and V, effective July 16, 1993.

The 1993/94 budget also includes an increase in group insurance cost of \$20,000 representing an estimated rate increase of 15%, effective July 1, 1993. The budget includes the continuation of the District paying the increased costs of the health insurance premium so that the employee contribution does not change through June 30, 1994.

We are also budgeting a \$41,564 increase in expenditures for PERS because during 1992/93 we exhausted the PERS surplus that can be used for offsetting the District's costs.

Building and Maintenance Accounts

Total Building and Maintenance costs are budgeted at \$369,311, a reduction of \$25,020 or 6%. The major reason for the overall lower costs is the projected reduction in utilities and other maintenance costs due to the proposed closing of the branches offset by increased telephone costs associated with the off-site locations during the building construction (approximately \$15,000). We have budgeted some on-going costs at the branches that will continue such as utilities, landscaping, fountain cleaning and alarm system costs. We have also included a provision for added maintenance cost at the branches, such as graffiti removal, because there would not be daily supervision if the branches were closed.

Office and Library Accounts

Total Office and Library expenditures are budgeted at \$269,975, up \$31,403 or 13%. This is primarily due to the cost of the November 1993 election of library trustees. This biennial expenditure is budgeted at \$72,150, which is up from the

November, 1991 election expenditure of \$48,970 due primarily to the fact that ballots now must be printed in six languages. Partially offsetting this cost increase are savings from the potential closing of the branches of \$8,000 and overall reductions in professional development, public relations, library supplies and the lower county fee for collecting a reduced amount of property taxes.

Library Materials

Library Materials are budgeted at \$402,394, a decrease of \$62,591 or 14%, from the approved 1992/93 budget. This budgeted amount represents 15% of the budgeted operating expenditure level.

The 1993/94 budget incorporates the reduction in library materials of \$47,390 related to the proposed July 16, 1993 branch closures plus additional savings of \$15,700 related to overall reductions associated with the reduced revenues.

Fixed Asset Accounts

We are not budgeting any fixed asset acquisitions in 1993/94.

Summary - Budget Shortfall

Given these changes in revenues and expenditures, there still exists a projected budget shortfall of \$44,655. Since the operating expenditures have been reduced, the overall fund balance requirement to provide cash for the period between July 1 through December 15 could be reduced.

Every indication from Sacramento is that the State will not make its statutory deadline for passing its budget. Nor do we expect that the County Board of Supervisors will meet its October deadline for SDAF distribution (if SDAF still exists). At a recent meeting of county and city librariens, they indicated that their jurisdictions are not waiting for the State's final budget before passing their local budgets. The magnitude of the cuts is so great that they cannot afford to wait. For the Library District, every week's delay in making a decision regarding the implementation of the recommended modules would cost approximately \$10,000.

Attachment D shows the five year impact of the implementation of the recommended modules. The budget deficit in future years is still problematic, with a projected five year deficit of over \$1.6 million. I am concerned that in future years the State will continue to increase the amount of "capture" of local dollars. Even the proposed 1993/94 budget does not recognize a "worst case" scenario in terms of possible State actions.

Nearly all of Orange County's water supply comes from two sources: imported water from the Metropolitan Water District (MWD) and groundwater managed by the Orange County Water District (OCWD). There are five agencies which receive water directly from the MWD: the Cities of Anaheim, Fullerton and Santa Ana; the Municipal Water District of Orange County (MWDOC); and the Coastal Municipal Water District (Coastal). The two municipal districts, MWDOC and Coastal, provide wholesale water to the remaining cities and districts in the County.

There are over 80 special districts within Orange County. Many of these are subsidiary districts of incorporated cities, but over fifty of these districts are

independent or dependent districts providing specific services to local areas.

There are sixteen dependent special districts within the County. These are

districts governed by either the Board of Supervisors (county service areas and

the Orange County Flood Control District) or appointed county supervisors,

city council members, and special district board members (County Sanitation

The other 38 districts are independent, with a board of directors which are

directly elected to administer the district. A majority of these districts (twenty),

A 1982 Orange County Grand Jury report recommended that OCWD, MWDOC and Coastal be consolidated to provide a single agency to import However, this recommendation was never water to Orange County. implemented.

Further complicating the water delivery picture, a third municipal water district, Tri-Cities Municipal Water District (Tri-Cities) purchases water from Coastal and sells to other retail agencies.

With few exceptions, the retail water districts are located in south Orange County, which, until recently, was predominantly unincorporated. With the recent incorporation activity in this area, many of these districts now provide water service to incorporated areas. Only one district, the Los Alisos Water District, lies entirely within the boundaries of single city (Lake Forest), and one other district, the Capistrano Beach County Water District, provides service almost exclusively to the City of Dana Point. The remainder of the districts serve substantially more than just one city.

WASTEWATER DISTRICTS

The County's wastewater is managed by three agencies: the County Sanitation Districts of Orange County (CSDOC); the Alisos Water Management Agency (AWMA); and the South East Regional Reclamation Authority (SERRA). These agencies provide wastewater treatment and outflow services for the County's cities and special districts.

Within the past several years, two agencies (the Stanton County Water District and Cypress County Water District) were dissolved with the cities they served assuming maintenance responsibility for the sewer lines. Several other consolidations and dissolutions have also been considered, including: the Garden Grove Sanitary District; Midway City Sanitary District; Los Alamitos County Water District; Dana Point Sanitary District; and Capistrano Beach Sanitary District.

COMMUNITY SERVICES DISTRICTS

Four of the five community services districts (CSDs) within the county provided limited services within private, gate-guarded communities. The fifth, Rossmoor Community Services District (RCSD), provides park and recreation, street lighting, and landscape maintenance services to approximately 10,000 residents in an unincorporated area of western Orange County.

RECREATION AND PARK DISTRICTS

The Silverado-Modjeska Park and Recreation District provides recreation services to residents within approximately 1,600 acres of canyon area in the Santa Ana foothills.

The Capistrano Bay Park and Recreation District provides park maintenance and recreation services to the residents of the City of Dana Point. Dana Point is the only city in Orange County which does not provide its own park and recreation services to its residents.

LIBRARY DISTRICTS

Both the Buena Park Library District and Placentia Library District operate libraries within the boundaries of incorporated cities. Unlike the cities of Anaheim, Fullerton, Santa Ana and Yorba Linda, these libraries are not administered by the city council, but by an independently elected board of directors.

COUNTY SERVICE AREAS

Since 1986, five of the County Service Areas (CSAs) in south Orange County have been dissolved as a result of incorporation and annexation activity. Six CSAs still remain, although one, the Aliso Viejo CSA is inactive, and another, the Harbors, Beaches and Parks CSA is a countywide district.

OPPORTUNITIES FOR CONSOLIDATION

Obviously, even this brief summary of special districts raises some questions regarding the need for so many special districts within a predominantly incorporated county. In addition to reconsidering the feasibility and benefits of consolidating the water wholesalers (OCWD, MWDOC, Coastal, and Tri-Cities) and further studying the potential for consolidating or dissolving wastewater districts serving incorporated areas, several other alternatives are worth considering.

These would include further study of the services provided by the Capistrano Bay Parks and Recreation District within the City of Dana Point, and both the Buena Park and Placentia Library Districts.

<u>CONCLUSIONS</u>

The intent of this report is to provide your Commission with an overview of the organization of special districts within Orange County. While staff has identified several districts for further study, it is not anticipated that all of these districts will be recommended for consolidation or dissolution. Likewise, other districts may be identified in the future for evaluation of the most efficient provision of the services they provide.

THE ASSEMBLY IS EXPECTED TO VOTE NEXT WEEK ON THE \$2.6 BILLION TAX SHIFT FROM LOCAL GOVERNMENTS TO THE STATE. The special district portion of this shift is likely to be more than four times the amount districts lost in the current year shift -- possibly close to \$800 million. Other likelihoods in this proposal include:

No protection for debt service

No multi-county exemption

Superpot -- taking all of special district augmentation/tax revenue, and letting the county boards of supervisors be responsible for allocating what remains after the shift.

It is crucial that you and your local allies contact your legislators now. Please tell them that:

- 1) The shift of local revenue to the state is a hidden tax increase. The state is using local revenue to solve the state's dilemma. Do not refer to this as a shift to schools. It is a shift of local revenue to solve the state's dilemma.
- 2) Of the \$2.6 billion scheduled to be taken, about \$1.1 billion is historically local revenue, not AB 8 funding.
- Instead of saying generally that you will have to cut back services or lay off staff, be specific. Assume that you will lose every dollar of your property tax revenue, and explain what this will mean to your district's residents in very human terms. Some examples would include:

Emergency medical response times will lengthen from 11 to 30 minutes.

Gang and racial tension prevention activities such as midnight youth basketball will cease to exist.

Library hours will be cut to just two days a week. Many unemployed people look to the library as a reference guide when job hunting.

The airport will no longer be able to assist in donor organ transport, or serve as a hub for firefighting. Business and the local economy will be hurt if the airport is unavailable.

Burial costs will triple. Even middle class families will no longer be able to afford a decent burial.

Water or utility rates, which went up 30% as a result of the current year shift, will have to be doubled again to make up for lost revenue. This is an unbearable burden for seniors living on fixed incomes.

The Assembly Committee on Ways and Means passed two versions of the State Budget yesterday; one with the 1/2 cent sales tax and one without. The 1/2 cent is scheduled to expire on June 30, 1993, and if it is allowed to expire, would add \$1.5 billion to the growing deficit.

Both versions of these proposed Budgets include shifting the entire \$2.6 billion of local agency property tax revenues as proposed by Governor Wilson. While specific details are not yet clear, we believe the proposals would shift \$590 million from non-enterprise special districts and \$150 million from enterprise special districts. The \$590 million includes \$200 million, which is the shortfall from the 1992-93 35%-10% formula that was to have raised \$375 million.

Additionally, we understand that there will be no exclusions or exemptions, including debt service or multi-county special districts.

We understand that these proposals will be on the Assembly Floor next week, either Monday or Tuesday. Given the shortness of time, you need to contact your Assembly member as soon as possible and urge them to vote against the property tax shift element of these Budget proposals.

The Governor is encouraging the Assembly Republicans to support the shift, which coupled with Democrats that have already indicated their support, could provide sufficient votes to pass these measures to the Senate.

I. SB 566 - OVER TWO WEEKS

Recently Senator Roberti, author of SB 566, the benefit assessment legislation, agreed to take amendments requested by Senator Quentin Kopp to address the issue of rent control, particularly with respect to San Francisco. In drafting the amendments to meet Senator Kopp's concern, care had to be taken to also take into consideration different concerns by Senator Tom Hayden, who is an advocate for rent control for some of the cities in his district.

Initially it was assumed that the language developed and agreed to on the previous evening was satisfactory and the bill would be taken up yesterday as scheduled. As Bill Siberling, the LA County Lobbyist, and I waited anxiously with CIA Legislative Committee Chair Anne Marie Gold, and David Flint with L.A. Fublic Library, word was passed to us by Senator Roberti's staff that Senator Kopp wanted the amendments to be submitted in Legislative Counsel form on the Floor. Senator Roberti's staff did their utmost in attempting to rush the amendments through the Legislative Counsel process. However, the amendments were still not ready by the time the Senate was ready to adjourn at approximately 3:00 p.m. yesterday. As a consequence, it became necessary for the bill to be put over. Since a number of senators will be out of town next Thursday, we have opted to put the bill over for two weeks.

II. SB 368 - COUNTY SPECIAL DISTRICT LIBRARIES

The Sanate passed SB 368-Kopp yesterday afternoon on a vote of 38-0. SB 368 would clarify that the twenty-nine property tax libraries are special districts for the purposes of retaining their property taxes. After a brief presentation by Senator Kopp, and there being no opposition on the Floor, presiding officer Senator Beverly asked for a substitution of the previous roll call and the bill was passed with little fantare.

III. BUDGET BILLS MOVE

Wednesday the Assembly Ways and Means Committee passed two Versions of an assembly budget to the Assembly Floor. The vote was along party lines with democrats voting yes and republicans voting no. The only difference between the two budgets (known as budget scenario A and budget scenario B) is that one is built on

extending the 1/2 cent sales tax, the other is not. Without the extension of the 1/2 cent sales tax, an additional \$1.4 billion out will need to be made. The Committee also passed approximately 20 "trailer bills" in skeletal form, which will be amended on the Floor next week with various provisions relating to the budget. Significant among these bills will likely be the \$2.6 billion property tax shift from local government to schools.

On the senate side, committees were wrapping up their actions on the senate budget and are expected to report to the full committee sometime next week or early the following week. The full Senate is scheduled to debate the budget bill shortly thereafter.

IV. BUDGET PICTURE WORSENS

During yesterday's Ways and Means Committee debate on the budget, Stave Olson, the Deputy Director of Finance, stated that the Governor's May revised budget, due out next week, will be based on a revenue shortfall \$2 to 2.5 billion worse than the Governor's January budget. One of the reasons, which caught the committee by surprise, was a \$600 million shortfall in property taxes that did not materialize for schools because of lower than expected assessed valuation increases and because the property taxes shifted from special districts to schools into the socalled ERAF fund were short about \$200 million. Other reasons, more commonly known, included federal funds for immigrant services that did not materialize, the Lagislature's refusal to eliminate the Governor's proposal to repeal the renter's tax oredit, and severe reductions to welfare benefits that the Governor had proposed but which the legislature refused to enact. What programs the Governor will cut to make up for the additional budget shortfall is anyone's guess at this point.

SUBJECT: Status Report

The following is defined to highlight the current status of a number of issues important to the coalition. I apologize for the delay in getting this report out, but the certain key bills were changing rapidly and I wanted to wait for the right moment to "snapshot" them for you.

GENERAL

There continues to be tremendous uncertainty and anxiety about the budget and fiscal situation. A few random comments:

- o Senate Minority Leader Ken Maddy had announced an expedited budget process a couple of months ago, wherein he expressed hope for early adoption of a final budget. Maddy has now been quoted that the outlook for budget passage is even worse than last year, and could stretch through the entire summer;
- o We are heading towards release of the "May revise" when updated revenue statistics are released, and many in the Capitol are speculating privately that the state will realize at that point that it has even less money than anticipated;
- o while there is not 100% unanimity being expressed, there seems to be general consensus that the \$2.6 billion shift will occur; in various committees legislators are uttering totally unchallenged remarks that "locals are going to lose a lot of property taxes";

- widespread discussion is occurring in various committees about "reinventing government." Government operations which used to be routine are generating serious examination, including the state's role in licensing, medical and mental health care and others. The Legislature is also struggling with fees over basic county services, such as trial courts, recorders offices and the like;
- o legislators' frustration seems to be spawning a growing conviction that counties should be put "on their own", with drastically reduced mandates and less fettered revenue options;
- o There is a small but growing movement among counties to stage a modern day "Boston Tea Party" by refusing to comply with any property tax shift. If this ever happened, the response by the state would be totally unpredictable.
- a working group has been established with approximately 25 participants, to discuss the local government fiscal situation. participants sector include Realtors, builders, Chamber of Commerce, California Taxpayers Association and others. public side, associations representing cities, counties, special districts. libraries, schools, and others are involved. The structure is rather elaborate formalized, and is being conducted by a "facilitator" provided by a U.C. conflict resolution organization. Should this group achieve a breakthrough of some type, it is possible that relieved legislators could defer to their ideas in a meaningful way.

With the preceding as background, the following is the current status of specific legislative issues:

Senate Bill 566 (Roberti) - Library Benefit O This CLA-sponsored Appopungnts: received a rather tortured hearing process by the Senate Local Government Committee. weeks ago, the committee met all morning on a variety of bills and did not address Senate Bill 566 until just prior to adjournment for "letter of Taken цp under a authorization" from Senator Roberti, Mike Dillon presented the bill to a committee short of members. Opposition to the bill (Realtors and other business groups

participating in the working group and hoping for a more "global solution") had been present but had left the room by the time the bill was taken up. A small group of witnesses testified in support, Senator Calderon (D-Los Angeles) made an impassioned speech on the importance of preserving libraries, and the bill was held over for "vote only" at a later time. No opposition testified.

Last week, the committee convened and took testimony on Senate Bill 695 (see below) but did not further address Senate Bill 566 until an unusual session reconvened after dinner when the bill was presented by Terri Burns from Senator Roberti's staff for vote only.

The bill was passed by a 4-1 vote, with four votes required for passage. Labelled "non-fiscal" by the Legislative Counsel, the bill need not be heard by the Appropriations Committee, and may be considered on the Senate Floor on May 6.

One person's perspective: While passage of the bill is a good sign, and certainly better than not passing it, committee approval seemed to represent agreement to keep the issue moving so it may be further considered. The committee may also approve Senate Bill 695, sending virtually the opposite message on benefit assessments. On the whole, the committee seems quite uncomfortable about a "race to the ballot box" for assessments, and they are also considering bills authorizing assessments for habitat maintenance and other purposes. It is not possible to discern a consistent policy in this area.

Senate Bill 695 (Leonard) - Benefit Assessments: This bill proposes a very radical restructuring of benefit assessment procedures. The basic theory is that benefit assessments are disguised taxes, imposed without sufficient public debate or even awareness. The most important feature of the bill is that votes would be required for all benefit assessments, in place of the current protest procedures. Depending upon whether the assessment has a "direct" or "indirect" benefit to the land (libraries would almost certainly be indirect"), the bill proposes

either a majority or two-thirds vote. committee asked Senator Leonard to consider lowering the indirect vote to 60%, or to consider making the vote for all purposes 60%. The present status on this point is unclear. Depending upon the specifics in the bill, benefit assessments could be difficult to approve as parcel taxes, thus eliminating them as viable revenue sources.

The bill was taken up last week when the Local Government Committee reconvened after Senator Leonard had a small coterie dinner. of witnesses in support of Senate Bill 695, chief among them the Howard Jarvis Taxpayers Association. An army of witnesses appeared in opposition, representing public agencies, bond counsel and underwriters, and others. With short-handed committee, Senator Leonard elected to put the bill over, probably again for "vote only", on May 5. Note that this is the day before the Senate Floor is likely to consider Senate Bill 566.

The fate of Senate Bill 695 in the Local Government Committee is unclear. The bill clearly has proponents on the committee, including the forceful Quentin Kopp from San Francisco. Then too, the committee clearly is concerned about the benefit assessment Senator Kopp described a plan to form trend: the entire City of San Francisco as a benefit assessment district for fire purposes, reportedly with an annual assessment which could be as high as \$490 per parcel.

Should Senate Bill 695 not pass committee, which is at least an even possibility, Senator Leonard is going to remain energized on the benefit assessment issue.

Assembly Bill 491 (Farr) Consolidations: The bill authorizes LAFCO to initiate consolidation proceedings, rather than to await initiation by the affected districts. Although this is a very significant bill in a very explosive area, the bill was passed rather routinely by the Assembly Local Government Committee last week. Of course passage of the bill was assured in Assemblyman Farr's own committee, but passage was made even more smooth with the support of the counties and special

districts association. In conversations with Ralph Heim, it is clear that CSDA has made a political determination to work closely with Mr. Farr to obtain a bill which might (1) get special district representation on LAFCO, and (2) provide that a modest protest by the community will table the consolidation proceedings. In other words, LAFCO might initiate consolidation, but if 10 - 20% of the residents protested, the merger would not forward. The fear 18 that legislative proposals on mergers might be draconian, more and given conversations with legislators, this is very likely the correct assessment.

Assembly Bill 491 is also a non-fiscal bill, and will next be heard on the Assembly Floor.

Many of the coalition representatives will be in Sacramento for Legislative Day. At that time we can report and discuss further our approach and strategy as we move closer to the budget season. I'd like to suggest ways of obtaining, magazines, books, dollars, and help for the library. It's time for new thinking, we don't need to keep going to the government for all our needs.

Go out to the citizens of Placentia with a mailing to every household and business asking for their help. Or, if postage costs are too high, have students walk their neighborhoods and distribute the letter in the form of flyers--Placentia is not that big a town--it could be done in a weekend or during the summer when the kids are not in school, it would give them something constructive to do.

Have a pledge drive like the public radio and TV stations have been doing for years. The Civic Center has a nice courtyard in the complex that could be used for summer concerts or art auction with works donated by some of the Placentia Art Association to raise money for the library. The Friends of the Library could help with this as well. This could be done several times a year. The pretty fountains are going to waste. An area like this would be utilized in a small European town to draw the community. Ours sits empty on summer evenings.

Involve the students who use the library—let them volunteer their time and learn library science at the same time for school credit. Get the schools involved with this type of program. Their libraries could use similar ideas. Where are the retired librarians and seniors who could volunteer a few hours on Saturday or Sunday to keep the library open?

How much does a magazine subscription cost--\$18 to 20/year. People spend more than that to attend a movie on a Saturday night. I'd gladly donate a couple of subscriptions. Get lists prepared of the publications you need and ask the local businesses donate money to purchase these books--it would be a tax write off for them. (Emphasize that fact to them.)

I'm sending a copy of this to Mayor Moreno and the City Manager, Mr. D'Amato. I have no expertise in marketing, but there must be individuals in Placentia that do who could advise you. You might put this request in your letter, making it clear, of course, that it is strictly on a voluntary basis. We have an lot of individuals out there who spend a great deal of time sitting in front of their TVs, bored, who could be contributing to worthwhile causes!



Program Participation: All groups are holding at the same levels as last month. With the program coming to a close in a month it is unlikely more students will be brought into the program.

Family Activities: This month at the library and Julie Shook explained the reference section and FIND ORANGE COUNTY to the adults, while Kay Schneider shared storytime with the children.

Officer John Samoya from the DARE program and Office Tom Valentine from the Gangs Detail were each featured speakers. The parents were very interested and with questions both sessions ran for the full one and a half hours.

The last field trip for the year was to the Oak Canyon Nature Center in Anaheim. This was a one and a half hour tour through a small area of the park, with a special session introducing the families to live specimens of the animals found in the park.

Dear Friends of Placentia Library District:

Many of you have called us in response to the Library's brochure explaining the impact of last year's State budget revenue reductions for the independent special district libraries.

The result at Placentia Library District so far has been a loss of 3.5 full time staff positions and a delay of maintenance and capital improvements for our building.

The only reason that this year's losses were barely noticeable to the public was that the Board of Trustees transferred funds from its reserve account in order to make the transition to the reduced budget level less immediately disruptive to public service levels.

Closing the Audio Visual Desk and the Check In Desk have allowed for improved allocation of existing staff time without significantly reducing service levels.

Future cuts, however, will mean loss of additional staff, which in turn will mean fewer hours and/or days of library services, and probably a reduction of the book budget.

In light of the recent media coverage of the benefits paid to the County of Orange management employees and the Board of Supervisors, and to the Santa Margarita Water District managers, we want you to know that Placentia Library District provides neither a car nor a car allowance to any of its employees, and that the members of the Board of Trustees receive no salary, per diem, nor any benefit other than reimbursement for actual travel expenses. The Board has established limits and requires receipts for all travel and meal expenses.

It is also a matter of public record that the District's wage and salary scale and personnel benefit package for staff at all levels, is one of the lowest of the public library agencies in Orange County.

Having your public library administered by an independent special library district means that its funds are handled separately from the City of Placentia's or the County of Orange's and that they cannot be diverted to other purposes -- they are used exclusively for the provision of public library services.

Having an elected Library Board of Trustees to manage the District means that the Board focuses entirely on library issues and plans its budget and services around identified community needs. In Placentia this has resulted in a wide range of programs from the business and telephone book collections, to curriculum-related programs in support of local schools, to the literacy and family literacy programs.

As you are talking with legislators and friends about the need for preserving the existing property tax funding for the Placentia Library District, and for the establishment of the authority for Benefit Assessment Districts for public libraries, please keep the following special issues in mind:

At the Placentia - Yorba Linda School District the elementary level school libraries have no paid staff; the junior high libraries do not have certified school librarians; and, while the high school libraries have certified school librarians, they are open only during school hours, and are closed during breaks, lunch periods, and sick and vacation leaves.

Placentia Library District has been providing direct support to the classrooms at all levels through visits by qualified librarians and provision of materials for classroom assignments.

Since there is no projection of any immediate improvement in the funding or staffing of local school libraries, Placentia Library District will remain an important link in the local education process. It is not a good time to be cutting back the hours of service or the book budget at the public library.

- » In these times of poor economy, citizens with limited financial resources need access to up-to-date health care information, home maintenance and improvement guides, car repair guides, travel information, and other consumer-related information and materials provided at Placentia Library District.
- » Residents of Placentia Library District should be able to determine the level of funding and quality of services offered at their public library.

Legislative establishment of the authority for Benefit Assessment Districts for public libraries will help guarantee local control over the level of service.

» Last year's State Budget cost Placentia Library District \$127,967, 11% of its operating budget.

The action being proposed for this year by the Governor's Budget, and supported by Assembly Democrats, shifts an additional \$2.6 billion in local government revenue, primarily property taxes, to the State. This is twice the amount of last year's shift!

If this shift occurs Placentia Library District would permanently lose an additional \$254,000 from its property tax allocation, for a total two year loss of \$381,000 or 34% of our operating budget.

It is very important to the existence of Placentia Library District that all the provisions of the State AB8 Bailout be repealed and that those funds revert to the State before it takes any additional property taxes from non-enterprise independent special districts like Placentia Library District.

Please contact the legislators representing Placentia Library District and express your support of the preservation of the existing property tax allocation, as well as your support of Senate Bill 566 (Roberti) which authorizes the establishment of benefit assessment districts for public library services.

The District's revenue loss of \$127,967 is based upon 10% of the District's total revenue, regardless of its source:

- → 10% of the property tax
- → 10% of the gifts received from individuals
- > 10% of the fines, fees, and rentals
- → 10% of the literacy grant
- 10% of the fees for children's arts and crafts programs

Proposition 13 Altered by State

Proposition 13 provided that cities, counties and special districts would have their revenues reduced proportionately. Each agency would receive the same percentage of property tax that it received before Proposition 13 — there would just be fewer dollars to distribute.

The 1992-1993 State Budget changed this basic distribution formula. For the first time since the passage of Proposition 13 the District's percentage of the property tax has been reduced and transferred to a newly established Educational Augmentation Fund.

By doing this the State frees up the money it had been giving to the schools to spend on the State's own programs.

The only tax revenue Placentia Library District receives is property tax. Unlike special districts in other counties of California, Placentia Library District receives no Special District Augmentation Funds, as described below.

County Diverts District's Augmentation Funds

The implementation of Proposition 13 in 1978 reduced Placentia Library District's property tax revenue by almost 60%.

In 1979 the Legislature passed AB 8 which shifted some of the school districts' property tax revenues to local agencies and replaced the school districts' losses with appropriations from the State General Fund.

Each county's AB 8 funds were allocated directly to the county, and each city's AB 8 funds were allocated directly

to the city. However each special district's AB 8 funds were deposited in a "Special District Augmentation Fund" in each county. The boards of county supervisors were given the authority to distribute this Fund.

Placentia Library District's contribution to the Special District Augmentation Fund in Orange County is \$400,957. In the last three years the Orange County Supervisors have allocated Placentia Library District NONE of the \$400,957 the District is contributing each year to the Fund.

Since the State Legislature granted the boards of county supervisors discretion over the distribution of the Special District Augmentation Fund, the Orange County Supervisors have chosen to fund only the districts that are under their administrative control: County Fire Department (this amount is in addition to the \$2,687,384 that the City of Placentia is paying for County fire service for the City); County Flood Control; County Harbor, Beaches and Parks; and the County Library.

The 1992-1993 State Budget Isn't Equitable

More than 20% of California's special districts have been exempted by the Legislature from the revenue reduction provisions of the 1992-1993 State Budget because they serve more than one county or meet other exclusionary criteria.

Not all independent special districts are being treated the same by the Budget Legislation.

- The Budget Legislation assumes that Placentia Library District is receiving all or part of its \$400,947 contribution to the Special District Augmentation Fund, when, in fact, the Orange County Supervisors have allocated \$0.00.
- Because it has been receiving no Special District Augmentation Funds for the past three years, Placentia Library District has been operating 100% under the restrictions of Proposition 13.

The Budget Legislation reduces Placentia Library District's property tax percentage below pre-Proposition 13 levels when it doesn't impose the same reductions on all other special districts.

Tell them that ... the Legislature needs to find a way to balance the State's budget without reducing Placentia Library District's Pre-Proposition 13 share of the property tax.

Tell them that ... it is not fair for Placentia Library District to lose 10% of its income when over 20% of the special districts in California lost nothing.

Tell them that ... agencies like Placentia Library District that are already successfully living 100% under the restrictions of Proposition 13 by not receiving any bailout money from the State through the Special District Augmentation Fund, should not be penalized any further until all other special districts, both independent and dependent, are operating under the same conditions.

Tell him that ... you want the Special District Augmentation Funds contributed by Placentia Library District to be allocated to Placentia Library District, and not used to support the dependent districts of the Orange County Supervisors.

Tell him that ... Placentia residents already spend \$2,687,384 from City tax dollars for County fire services and they should not have to supplement it with library funds. Also, Placentia residents receive no direct services from the Orange County Library.







From tony tract homes sprouting on the eastside to the mom-and-pop Mexican restaurants that dot the streets of old town, residents know first-hand about cultural diversity.

After incorporating 67 years ago, the city has begun to show its growing pains. However, city officals and longtime residents believe growth doesn't have to affect Placentia's "sense, of community."

Saud Ammar, the city's principal librarian, has a plan.

With a grant from the California Council for the Humanities, she has embarked the city on a six-week study of itself.
"In these days with cultur

diversity on the rise in the Pla centia community, we've grown tremendously with people from all kinds of cultural and economic backgrounds," said Ammar, who moved to the city 20 years ago.

"What we are trying to do is . create some awareness in the minds of community leaders in order to keep the sense of community, and not to lose it."

The program consists of six meetings to grapple with issues from utopia to the definition of a community. Those who participate in the study - 20 community leaders who represent different walks of life - also are required to read literature provided through the program.

The program was developed for San Bernardino and Riverside counties in 1992 as a way to handle a boom in growth. In Placentia, the program is a way to gauge the future, according to one program member.



Local contest winners recount their personal achievements

arading down Bradford Avenue in 1959 with his first-grade buddies, Jess Ramirez knew he was headed for adventure. Hundreds of picture books could transport him from Placentia Library to pirate caves, far-away lands or Oz. Reading wasn't necessary; the bold, colorful drawings told him the story.

Reading remained outside the big picture until three years ago when a Placentia Library literacy volunteer suggested 37-yearold Ramirez undergo testing for dyslexia

The advice changed his life. With help from the Dyslexia Society and literacy tutor Doris Hand, Ramirez went on to complete five books, read half the Bible and begin studies for his General Education Diploma test.

The personal achievements were documented in Ramirez's essay, "How the Library Changed My Life," which took one of four top honors in the Placentia Library National Library Week Contest.

Last week, Ramirez was joined by Yorba Linda residents Carolyn Hislop and Rosemary Pfortmiller and another Placentian, Christine Chao, at the library's awards ceremony.

Ramirez recalled the difficult school years, and the times he had to convince potential employers that his mechanical talents rather than book knowledge would make him acceptable on the job.

"I had to drop out of high school in my senior year and float from job to job," Ramirez recounted. "One tool company kept me for nearly 10 years until they closed down."

It was during a jobless time when he was "bummed out," that Ramirez stopped by the Placentia Library and learned about the literacy program. The opportunity to learn, he remembered, opened a new world to express himself in poetry and writing.

Nowadays, Ramirez works as a part-time gardener at Yorba Linda Country Club, and has plans to enroll in Fullerton College's horticulture program.

Yorba Linda winner Rosemary Pfortmiller jogged her memory bank to recall the importance of

childhood excursions to the library. Raised in the Missouri Ozarks, she regularly accompanied her mother on the 20-mile drive to the nearest library in Clinton, Mo.

"Andrew Carnegie told the people in Clinton that he would give money to build a library if they would donate the land," Pfortmiller said. "We came to know it as the Carnegie Castle"

Intrigued by stories of courage, Pfortmiller checked out all the books she was allowed. Her descriptive account of the learning repository and its surroundings convinced library judges the Carnegie Castle had made a major impact on Pfortmiller's future.

Now attending Los Angeles Harbor College, the Yorba Linda woman is enrolled in art and writing courses. Pfortmiller said she has written a children's book which she plans to illustrate.

Pfortmiller's husband and daughter, Sarah, a student at Yorba Linda Middle School, were on hand to congratulate their mother.

Christine Chao, a freshman at

Sunny Hills High School in Fullerton, won accolades for her impressions of library life. Raised in Taiwan, she remembered Chinese libraries have less tables and work stations, but an abundance of research areas.

Chao, whose older sister Stephanie won honorable mention in the Placentia contest, said she particularly likes the Placentia Library for its quietness and large inventory of Cliff Notes.

Last year, Chao passed the International Baccalaureate Program exam at Sunny Hills, allowing her to transfer from Placentia schools.

In her prize-winning account, Chao said the library "has educated, enlightened and enriched me in every part of my life."

Fourth-grader Carolyn Hislop wrote a fanciful essay, "The Child, The Library and The Magic Book" to illustrate her love for the library.

Hislop and Phillip Donnelly, who won honorable mention in the young people's division, are fourth-grade classmates at the

private Carden Country Day School in Fullerton. Once a month, Carden teachers transp their students to the Placentia brary.

Library workers help man in need

Family left with nothing after fire

Henry Guzman stared reluctantly at a plate of cake, sluggishly dragging his fork back-and-forth through the white icing.

The former Placentia resident has been too upset to eat since a fire ripped through the Santa Ana apartment he shared with his wife and three children. Left with nothing, his hometown library held a benefit luncheon Friday to lend a hand.

"This (luncheon) is being held for me, but I can't even eat," said Guzman, 32, who has been working the graveyard shift as a mechanic to save money to buy a home.

"I haven't been able to eat since
the fire. Even though ... I can't explain how proud this makes me to
be a part of this community," he

All Guzman's mother had to do was tell her co-workers at the Placentia Library about the tragedy and within days the luncheon was planned. All together, the benefit raised more than \$500 for the family.

Esther Guzman said it just shows how much the community cares about one of its own. Her son, daughter-in-law and grandchildren now share her three-bedroom house in the city.

"I was so touched that the people really do care," said a teary-eyed Esther Guzman, who works in the children's section. "This library has backed us up all the way ... offering encouragement and helping out with whatever they can. I'll never forget this."


Those who attended the luncheon, which comprised mostly of workers at the Placentia Civic Center, also donated goods to the benefit.

By the end of the day, a small table designated for donations was crammed with blankets, clothes, shoes, stuffed animals, games and other merchandise.

Henry Guzman said he might have died during the April 12 blaze.

Guzman's 11-year-old daughter, Jessica, woke him up from a nap after he returned from his night job. Clouds of smoke was emanating from the ceiling, which was already glowing from hot embers, he said.

The fire was started when workers using a blow torch accidentally ignited a bush, he said. All 42 units in the complex were destroyed, but no one was injured.

Library's outlook is dire

Loss of tax revenues may alter operations

Imagine that the Placentia Library was open only three days, and when residents could get in the door the se-

lection of new books is diminished.
This isn't anything new for library administrators. They've been imagin-ing this scenario ever since state lawmakers threatened to tap into property tax revenue used to fund library dis-

The library could stand to lose 20 percent of its operating budget, ac-

cording to one official.

Administrators of the library -which is supported only on property tax revenue collected in Placentia aren't taking the threat sitting down. In fact, the library's director and president spent the past week lobbying in Sacramento to help maintain the amount of money they get each year.

Library Director Elizabeth Minter, who met with state Sen. John Lewis, R-Orange, and Assemblyman Ross Johnson, R-Fullerton, on Tuesday, said time might be running out.

"It's really scary, public libraries as we know it can be changed dramatically in this state for a long time," said Minter. "We're talking major cuts. We need to keep the message alive to keep

our funding sources."

She wants lawmakers grappling with the state budget to come up with

"funding sources that will take the place for what we are going to lose."
The Placentia Library District's

main source of funding is local property taxes. Unlike other libraries, Pla-

LIBRARY: Revenue loss may alter operation

The state budget proposed for next year by Gov. Pete Wilson and supported by the Assembly shifts an additional \$2.6 billion in local government revenue — mostly property tax — to the state.

If this shift occurs, Placentia Library District would permanently lose an additional S254,000 from its property tax allocation. In two years it would total S381,000 or 34 percent of its operating budget.

Library administrators are lobbying state legislators for another special assessment tax to take the place of the lost property tax. However, any new assessments would be put to a vote within the city.

Last year the state siphoned 11 percent of the library's budget — about \$128,000. The result was the

loss of 3.5 full-time staff positions and the delay of maintenance and improvements to the building, located in the Placentia Civic Center.

The Library Board of Trustees transferred money from its reserve accounts to soften the cuts, something President Peggy Dinsmore believes won't happen again.

"Residents couldn't immediately notice how the cuts impacted us over the past year," she said. "We won't be able to cushion the cuts proposed by the state this year. We are just simply going to have to take the brunt of it."

Mayor Maria Moreno, a member of the library's Literacy Volunteers of America Board, said the public needs to lend a hand and help out.

"One option the library might

look into is creating a foundation with residents and business of the city and look into the possibility of funding new books," said Moreno, who looks back fondly on her days going to the library's original site in Old Town while growing up.
"I would hope the residents

"I would hope the residents would begin writing to their legislators and letting them know how important the library is to them and how it affects their lives directly," she said.

SUBJECT:

Santiago Library System Report

The Council of the Santiago Library System (SLS) met on May 13, 1993.

SLS has renewed its contract with the Metropolitan Cooperative Library System (MCLS) for administrative services for Fiscal Year 1993-1994. This contract was arranged because SLS does not have funding adequate to hire a full time administrator unless its members begin paying dues, and qualified part time administrators are not available. SLS Council members reported that they are happy with the quantity and quality of services being provided by MCLS. SLS also contracts with MCLS for the provision of second level reference services.

SLS has authorized an additional contract with MCLS for the provision of financial services. The Orange County Auditor's Office has been providing this service but the costs have become excessive and SLS has been having problems with its independent annual audit because of some of the communication problems and accounting practices in the County Office.

As a result of these changes the Orange County Library has determined that it no longer has space to accommodate the SLS Office so it is in the process of being moved back to the Fullerton Public Library. Fullerton has agreed to provide the space without cost to SLS.

§54956.95. Closed Sessions; Joint Powers Insurance Authorities

- (a) Nothing in this chapter shall be construed to prevent a joint powers agency formed pursuant to Article 1 (commencing with Section 6500) of Chapter 5 of Division 7 of Title 1, for purposes of insurance pooling, or a local agency member of the joint powers agency, from holding a closed session to discuss a claim for the payment of tort liability losses, public liability losses, or workers' compensation liability incurred by the joint powers agency or a local agency member of the joint powers agency.
- (b) Nothing in this chapter shall be construed to prevent the Local Agency Self-Insurance Authority formed pursuant to Chapter 5.5 (commencing with Section 6599.01) of Division 7 of Title 1, or a local agency member of the authority, from holding a closed session to discuss a claim for the payment of tort liability losses, public liability losses, or workers' compensation liability incurred by the authority or a local agency member of the authority.
- (c) Nothing in this section shall be construed to affect Section 54956.9 with respect to any other local agency.

§54957. Closed Sessions; Exclusion of Witnesses

Nothing contained in this chapter shall be construed to prevent the legislative body of a local agency from holding closed sessions with the Attorney General, district attorney, sheriff, or chief of police, or their respective deputies, on matters posing a

threat to the security of public buildings or a threat to the public's right of access to public services or public facilities, or from holding closed sessions during a regular or special meeting to consider the appointment, employment, evaluation of performance or dismissal of a public employee or to hear complaints or charges brought against such employee by another person or employee unless such employee requests a public hearing. The legislative body also may exclude from any such public or closed meeting, during the examination of a witness, any or all other witnesses in the matter being investigated by the legislative body.

For the purposes of this section, the term "employee" shall not include any person elected to office, or appointed to an office by the legislative body of a local agency; provided, however, that nonelective positions of city manager, county administrator, city attorney, county counsel, or a department head or other similar administrative officer of a local agency shall be considered employee positions; and provided further, that nonelective positions of general manager, chief engineer, legal counsel, district secretary, auditor, assessor, treasurer or tax collector of any governmental district supplying services within limited boundaries shall be deemed employee positions.

Nothing in this chapter shall be construed to prevent any board, commission, committee or other body organized and operated by any private organization as defined in Section 54952 from holding closed sessions to consider (a) matters affecting the national security, or (b) the appointment, employment, evaluation

of performance or dismissal of an employee or to hear complaints or charges brought against such employee by another person or employee unless such employee requests a public hearing. Such body also may exclude from any such public or closed meeting, during the examination of a witness, any or all other witnesses in the matter being investigated by the legislative body.

S54957.1. Closed Sessions; Public Report of Employment Decisions The legislative body of any local agency shall publicly report at the public meeting during which the closed session is held or at its next public meeting any action taken, and any roll call vote thereon, to appoint, employ or dismiss a public employee arising out of any closed session of the legislative body.

§54957.2. Minute Book Record of Closed Sessions; Inspection

(a) The legislative body of a local agency may, by ordinance or resolution, designate a clerk or other officer or employee of the local agency who shall then attend each closed session of the legislative body and keep and enter in a minute book a record of topics discussed and decisions made at the meeting. The minute book made pursuant to this section is not a public record subject to inspection pursuant to the California Public Records Act (Chapter 3.5 (commencing with Section 6250) of Division 7 of Title 1), and shall be kept confidential. The minute book shall be available only to members of the legislative body or, if a violation of this chapter is alleged to have occurred at a

closed session, to a court of general jurisdiction wherein the local agency lies. Such minute book may, but need not, consist of a recording of the closed session.

(b) An elected legislative body of a local agency may require that each legislative body all or a majority of whose members are appointed by or under the authority of the elected legislative body keep a minute book as prescribed under subdivision (a).

§54957.5. Agendas and Other Writings Distributed for Discussion or Consideration at Public Meetings; Public Records; Inspection; Closed Sessions

- (a) Notwithstanding Section 6255 or any other provisions of law, agendas of public meetings and other writings, when distributed to all, or a majority of all, of the members of a legislative body of a local agency by a member, officer, employee, or agent of such body for discussion or consideration at a public meeting of such body, are public records under the California Public Records Act (Chapter 3.5 (commencing with Section 6250) of Division 7 of Title 1) as soon as distributed, and shall be made available pursuant to Sections 6253 and 6256. However, this section shall not include any writing exempt from public disclosure under Section 6253.5, 6254, or 6254.7.
- (b) Writings which are public records under subdivision (a) and which are distributed prior to commencement of a

public meeting shall be made available for public inspection upon request prior to commencement of such meeting.

- (c) Writings which are public records under sub-division (a) and which are distributed during a public meeting and prior to commencement of their discussion at such meeting shall be made available for public inspection prior to commencement of, and during, their discussion at such meeting.
- (d) Writings which are public records under subdivision (a) and which are distributed during their discussion at a public meeting shall be made available for public inspection immediately or as soon thereafter as is practicable.
- (e) Nothing in this section shall be construed to prevent the legislative body of a local agency from charging a fee or deposit for a copy of a public record pursuant to Section 6257. The writings described in subdivisions (b), (c), and (d) are subject to the requirements of the California Public Records Act (Chapter 3.5 (commencing with Section 6250), Division 7, Title 1), and subdivisions (b), (c), and (d) shall not be construed to exempt from public inspection any record covered by that act, or to limit the public's right to inspect any record required to be disclosed by that act. This section shall not be construed to be applicable to any writings solely because they are properly discussed in a closed session of a legislative body of the local agency. Nothing in this chapter shall be construed to require a legislative body or a local agency to place any paid advertisement or any other paid notice in any publication.

(f) "Writing" for purposes of this section means "writing" as defined under Section 6252.

§54957.6. Closed Sessions: Legislative Body of Local Agencies: Salaries, Salary Schedules or Fringe Benefits: Mandatory Subjects

(a) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, a legislative body of a local agency may hold closed sessions with the local agency's designated representatives regarding the salaries, salary schedules, or compensation paid in the form of fringe benefits of its represented and unrepresented employees. Closed sessions of a legislative body of a local agency, as permitted in this section, shall be for the purpose of reviewing its position and instructing the local agency's designated representatives. Closed sessions, as permitted in this section, may take place prior to and during consultations and discussions with representatives of employee organizations and unrepresented employees.

For the purposes enumerated in this section, a legislative body of a local agency may also meet with a state conciliator who has intervened in the proceedings.

(b) In addition to the closed sessions authorized by subdivision (a), the legislative body, as defined by Sections 54952, 54952.2, 54952.3, and 54952.5, of a public agency, as defined by subdivision (c) of Section 3501, may hold closed sessions with its designated representatives on mandatory subjects

within the scope of representation of its represented employees, as determined pursuant to Section 3504.

§54957.7. Closed Sessions; Statement of Reasons and Legal Authority; Scope of Coverage; Notice

Prior to or after holding any closed session, the legislative body of the local agency shall state the general reason or reasons for the closed session, and may cite the statutory authority, including the specific section and subdivision, or other legal authority under which the session is being held. In the closed session, the legislative body may consider only those matters covered in its statement. In the case of special, adjourned, and continued meetings, the statement shall be made as part of the notice provided for the special, adjourned, or continued meeting. Nothing in this section shall require or authorize the giving of names or other information which would constitute an invasion of privacy or otherwise unnecessarily divulge the particular facts concerning the closed session.

§54957.8. Closed Sessions; Legislative Body of a Multijurisdictional Drug Law Enforcement Agency

Nothing contained in this chapter shall be construed to prevent the legislative body of a multijurisdictional drug law enforcement agency, or an advisory body of a multijurisdictional drug law enforcement agency, from holding closed sessions to discuss the case records of any ongoing criminal investigation of



the multijurisdictional drug law enforcement agency or of any party to the joint powers agreement, to hear testimony from persons involved in the investigation, and to discuss courses of action in particular cases.

"Multijurisdictional drug law enforcement agency," for purposes of this section, means a joint powers entity formed pursuant to Article 1 (commencing with Section 6500) of Chapter 5 of Division 7 of Title 1, which provides drug law enforcement services for the parties to the joint powers agreement.

The Legislature finds and declares that this section is within the public interest, in that its provisions are necessary to prevent the impairment of ongoing law enforcement investigations, to protect witnesses and informants, and to permit the discussion of effective courses of action in particular cases.

§54957.9. Authorization to Clear Room Where Meeting Willfully Interrupted, Etc.

In the event that any meeting is willfully interrupted by a group or groups of persons so as to render the orderly conduct of such meeting unfeasible and order cannot be restored by the removal of individuals who are willfully interrupting the meeting, the members of the legislative body conducting the meeting may order the meeting room cleared and continue in session. Only matters appearing on the agenda may be considered in such a session. Representatives of the press or other news media, except those participating in the disturbance, shall be allowed to attend any

RE: Legislative Update

I. SB 566 PASSES SENATE

Just before noon the Senate passed SB 566-Roberti, the benefit assessment legislation co-sponsored by CLA and the County of Los Angeles. The vote was 27 ayes to 9 noss. The twenty-seven votes were cast by all the Democrats except Senators Wadie Deddeh and Nicholas Petris, who were not on the floor at the time of the vote, and five Republicans. The Republicans voting yes were Senators Marian Bergeson, Robert Beverly, Bill Craven, Republican Leader Ken Maddy, and Becky Morgan. Nine Republican Senators voted no. They were Senators Frank Hill, Rob Hurtt, Bill Leonard, Tim Leslie, John Lewis, Don Rogers, Cathie Wright, and Phil Wyman. Republican Senator David Kelley did not vote.

Senator Roberti, in presenting the measure on the floor, stated, "The future of all public libraries in California is jeopardized by our budget reductions and revenue shortages at all levels of government. Libraries have very limited authority to raise additional revenue and there should be some degree of local control and viable local options to preserve library services." Senator Michael Thompson also rose to support the measure, saying that "we need to ensure libraries are not only open but up to date. In recessionary times businesses and people looking for work rely more on libraries. This measure is the ultimate in local control." Republican Senator Hurtt of Orange County was the only senator speaking in opposition to \$3 566.

II, THINGS MOVING FAST

The Budget Conference Committee is still hoping to wrap up activities this week. The leadership of both houses is expecting to bring the budget bill up on the floor for vote next Tuesday. Added urgency is given to the discussions because of the need to enact any budget related legislation to extend the males tax by June 20. This date is important in order to have retailer requirements in place by the effective date of July 1. Still to be resolved are the major issues relating to education and local government, including the property tax shift and extension of the males tax.

III. LOCAL GOVERNMENT WORKING GROUP

Yesterday a special Assembly/Senate Local Government Working

Governor's local government property tax shift. Members of the Working Group included Assemblyman Mike Gotch, Chair, and Assemblymembers Jan Goldsmith, Fred Aguiar, Valerie Brown, Philip Isenberg, and Trice Harvey. Senators included Co-Chair Chuck Calderon, Marian Bergeson, Newton Russell, Mike Thompson, Cathie Wright, and Lucy Killes. The committee hearing was unusual in that it did not involve the normal staff members from the Local Government Committees. Instead the Office of Majority Services set up the hearing. Additionally, the usual organizations representing cities, counties, and special districts were not invited to participate directly. Instead, selected witnesses representing public safety, a representative of a small county, and representatives of the Association of Resitors and California Building Industry Association were scheduled witnesses.

In his opening statement, Chairman Mike Gotch stated that the Working Group wanted to "seek a spark of information for solution and not just hear an inventory of disasters." No miracle solutions emerged from the testimony. Most of those who testified encouraged extension the sales tax. The Los Angeles County Under-Sheriff, went so far as to recommend rejection of the property tax shift and extending the sales tax for law enforcement only. The Working Group continues to meet behind closed doors and had been expected to make recommendations to the Budget Conference Committee this afternoon. However, we have just received word that the Working Group would like to postpone their recommendations until Friday. The Budget Conference Committee had hoped to wrap up its actions by Friday and this request could delay that effort.

IV. "SUPER POT" MTC.

As reported to you previously the Governor's budget proposes a \$2.6 billion shift of property taxes from cities, countles, and special districts to schools. The Assembly also proposes a \$2.6 billion shift, but over two years. The Senate proposes a \$1.3 billion shift. In addition, the Governor's budget proposes to give all of the special district augmentation fund monles to the counties to offset their lost property tax. The SDAF represents about \$400 million in round numbers. The Governor's budget would also give counties the remainder of special district property taxes in the amount of approximately \$1 billion. Ostensibly the counties would give this money back to special districts. However, there is no requirement that they do so. This approach is slightly different than last year's "super pot" which at least required that the special district taxes be given back to special districts. CLA is actively opposing the "super pot" approach as it would negatively impact most county special district libraries and independent special district libraries. There seems to be growing resistance to this concept. Additionally, there is increased resistance to the entire \$2.6 billion property tax shift. At this point \$1.3 billion is a more realistic number. Whether or not this number can be reduced further depends on the

CONFERENCE COMMITTEE TO CONSIDER LOCAL GOVERNMENT BUDGET FRIDAY

On Tuesday, June 8, the Joint Senate/Assembly Local Government Budget Working Group held a hearing to hear from law enforcement, builders and realtors about the effects of the proposed property tax shift. During the hearing, Victor Potthorff of the California State Association of Counties said that the counties are not interested in superpot, and that it simply won't work.

The joint working group, chaired by Assemblymember Mike Gotch and Senator Charles Calderon, had been requested by the Senate/Assembly budget conference committee to come back to them with a local government piece for the state budget by Wednesday, June 9. Members on the local government working group include: Assemblymembers Gotch, Harvey, Valerie Brown, Aguiar, Isenberg, Goldsmith; and Senators Leslie, Bergeson, Calderon, and Russell.

Yesterday, Calderon and Gotch came to the conference committee and requested more time. They intend to present a local government piece of the budget to the conference committee by noon Friday. Gotch said the local government working group had come to the conclusion that a \$2.6 hillion shift would be indetensible, and that the plan they will present will have a ceiling of \$1.3 billion. It is unclear whether this would also include the shift of an additional \$1.3 billion the following year.

Other suggestions the local government group is considering making are: extension of the 1/2 cent sales tax beyond what the Governor has committed to, mandate relief to the tune of about \$200 million, and some form of tax loophole closure. Gotch also referred to the working group's support of the Legislative Analyst's recommendations, and their interest in beginning to move toward that end beginning with the outcome of this year's budget debate.

SUBJECT: Budget Conference Committee Status

As expected, local government working group chairman Mike Gotch made a report to the Budget Conference Committee early vesterday evening. Gotch made the following points:

- the working group is struggling and finding consensus difficult, and needs until noon Friday to complete its work;
- o the group is unanimous that a property tax shift of \$2.6 billion is too high, and that a more appropriate figure is \$1.3 billion or less;
- o the budget package should contain at least \$200 million of "mandate relief";
- o the Legislature should enact automatic "triggers" to reduce spending if the economy does not approve;
- o the sales tax should be extended for at least six months and possibly longer;
- o "loophole" closures should be considered;
- o the budget should seek to minimize impact on fire protection and law enforcement;
- o the budget should not sacrifice long term financial stability for local governments, and should protect the property tax base;
- o the Legislature should seek the full adoption of the Legislative Analyst's recommendations over time.

Gotch's comments raise a whole host of questions. For example, John Vasconcellos asked whether the contemplated \$1.3 billion cut is inclusive or exclusive of the sales tax extension. After all, six months of extended sales tax is estimated to produce \$1.4 billion, which would mean that local government was suffering no cut at all. Gotch refused

to answer even this most basic question, indicating that the working group was struggling with that and other issues. Similarly, it was unclear what he meant by implementation of LAO recommendations." That comment could simply mean that the Legislature should continue to proceed AB 1335, permitting LAFCOs to consolidation proceedings. Third, it is unclear what he means by loophole closure: he may be referring to proposals to reduce the entertainment tax deduction to 50%.

Several general comments may be in order. The first is that the conference committee appears to be experiencing growing frustration, and the possibility exists that the rather productive and even cordial atmosphere may change in the next few days. It is even possible, although probably unlikely, that the resolve to complete the budget process by June 15 could unravel when the "mega-issues" are considered. Second, it is clear that no \$2.6 billion property tax shift will occur. All the major players, from Willie Brown to Jim Brulte to Ken Maddy to Mike Gotch and others agree that some lesser amount must be chosen. Third, it is clear that John Vasconcellos will insist on some cuts to local government, as he believes that the majority of the pain in this year's budget thus far has been allocated to the state. Fourth, it appears that support for the superpot concept is dwindling as the debate continues. Fifth, it looks like enterprise districts will be a major victim of the shift, as there is some perception that these districts were treated less harshly last year.

Very tough times still lie ahead, especially as Republicans in the Senate and Assembly make themselves heard. Tim Leslie warned the conference committee recently that no revenue enhancements would be considered by his caucus unless they were accompanied by reforms in the welfare system and mandate relief. The Assembly Republican Caucus allegedly will accept no revenue enhancements at all.

In the face of all this uncertainty, the conference committee will reconvene today at 2:00 p.m., apparently to continue working on open line items in the budget. local government piece will not be considered until at least mid-day tomorrow.
