A review of the Two Percent Assessment Appeals Case found that the Placentia Library District would initially be impacted by the \$130,00 cumulative loss, with an annual initial loss of \$66,000.

The minutes of the March 4 board meeting were approved as read. In the absence of the treasurer, Camile Himes, there was no treasurer's report. Eleanor Rankin, financial secretary, reported she had deposited \$1222.00 the month of March.

Annual Meeting, Monday April 15: All arrangements for the speaker, Gail Tsukiyama, are complete. Jim will meet her plane on Sunday. She will have lunch with a group from the library on Monday. Monday afternoon she will give a workshop for secondary students. 5 students from each of our 4 local high schools have been invited to participate. Her presentation Monday evening will be televised live on the Library Channel. Author's Luncheon: Final proceeds were \$7,698.76

Membership Campaign: Eleanor Rankin wrote personal notes to the 73 patrons that did not respond to our campaign to rejoin the Friends of the Placentia Library. She has already had 13 of these send in their reinstatement and expects to hear from others. The directors were unanimous in praising her for such a lot of dedicated hard work on our behalf.

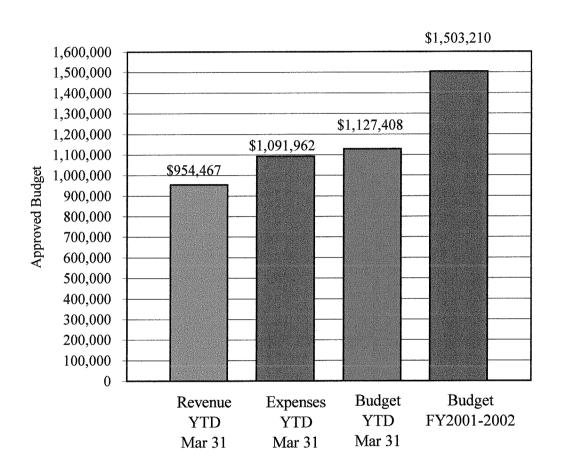

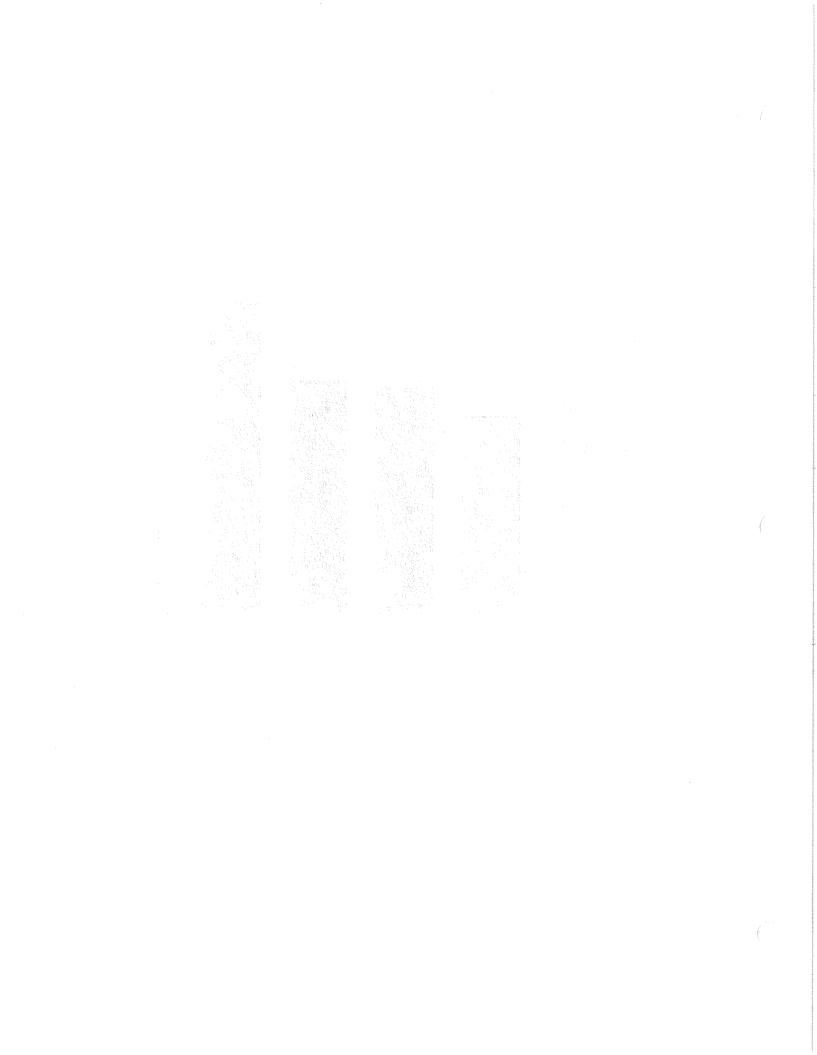

LEGISLATIVE UPDATE – April 5, 2002

The Legislature returned from Spring Recess on Monday and policy committee began to consider hundreds of bills that face the April 26th deadline to act upon bills that are also referred to the fiscal committees. May 10th is the deadline for policy committees to report non-fiscal bills to the Assembly/Senate Floors.

Among the bills of interest to CSDA being considered this week are:

SENATE BILL 1441

Senate Bill 1441 by Senator Oller proposed to prohibit local public entities from expending public funds for a variety of "political" purposes. CSDA opposed SB 1441, which was defeated on Wednesday in the Senate Elections Committee.

SENATE BILL 1346

Introduced by Senator Kuehl, Senate Bill 1346 would make grants available for local agencies for the purpose of utilizing road construction materials containing recycled tires. CSDA supports SB 1346, which passed the Senate Environmental Quality Committee on Monday with a 6 to 1 vote.

SENATE BILL 1822

Also on Monday, the Senate Environmental Quality Committee passed, with amendments, Senate Bill 1822 by Senator Sher, relating to public water systems and public health goals for perchlorate.

As amended, SB 1822 would define "public health goal" to be a goal established by OEHHA, pursuant to specified criteria. Additionally, the bill requires OEHHA to adopt a public health goal for perchlorate by January 1, 2004, using existing criteria established for public health goals. Finally, SB 1822 requires the Department of Health Services to adopt a "primary drinking water standard for perchlorate by July 1, 2003.

LEGISLATURE AT THE STARTING LINE

While there was no legislative activity this week relative to issues of importance to special districts, policy committees are commencing to set many of the bills that were introduced this year.

Most of the legislative activity this week focused around the State Budget subcommittees. In all cases, chairs of the various budget subcommittees that met this week went to great lengths to detail the State's current fiscal crisis and warn that "everything is on the table" if the Legislature is to adopt a balanced 2002-03 State Budget.

As indicated above, Senate and Assembly policy committee will begin in earnest next week to consider the hundreds of bills introduced this year. The Legislature will be off the following week, March 25 through March 31 for Spring Recess, after which the pace of legislative activity will increase markedly.

One bill scheduled for the Senate Local Government Committee on March 20 is Senate Bill 1378 by Senator Margett, relating to city websites. As proposed to be amended, Senate Bill 1378 would require cities and independent special districts (and maybe counties) that have websites to include thereon specified information, including the address, telephone/fax number of the public agency's office and times and locations of board meetings. CSDA is working with Senator Margett to ensure that special districts with websites are not required to include additional information that is not relevant to governance and administration of the special district.

GOVERNMENT AFFAIRS DAY 2002

On Monday, March 11, 2002, over 190 special district representatives attended the 2002 Special District Government Affairs Day. It was a great success! Participants received a comprehensive update from CSDA's Legislative Advocate Ralph Heim, a workers' compensation reform update, potential ballot measure overview, a spirited discussion on the State fiscal situation, as well as insight into the Davis Administration priorities, and Smart Growth. It was a very full day.

Special thanks to the Day's cosponsors: California Association of Recreation and Park Districts, California Association of Public Cemeteries, Mosquito and Vector Control Association of California, and California Rural Water Association.

PERS BILL REVIEW PANEL

We greatly appreciate the volunteers who have stepped forward to participate in the PERS Bill Review Panel. CSDA had asked in an earlier Legislative Update for volunteers to participate in an "email" review panel on the high number of bills introduced that propose changes in PERS. Today is the cut-off for volunteers so those of you who did put your name forward, you will be receiving additional information and bill numbers early next week. BILL TO LOWER VOTE THRESHOLD FOR LIBRARY BONDS SET FOR HEARING

The Senate Education Committee has set SCA 10 by Senator Jackie Speier for hearing on Wednesday, April 17, at 8:30 a.m. Proposition 39 on the November 2000 ballot reduced the percentage needed to pass school bonds from 2/3 to 55%. SCA 10 would amend the same section of the constitution, allowing for library construction bonds to pass with a 55% vote, rather than the current 66 and 2/3rds requirement. The author states in her background sheet, "Despite the critical role played by libraries in the educational system, they are treated differently than school buildings for purposes of capital improvement projects." Senator Speier believes that the 2/3rds vote requirement puts California's educational and library infrastructure at "a disadvantage relative to that of other states, and the backlog of infrastructure projects illustrates the consequences."

ASSEMBLY BUDGET SUBCOMMITTEE HEARS PLF AND RAISES QUESTIONS REGARDING LIBRARY BOND

Before the Legislature left on a one-week Easter Recess, the Assembly Budget Subcommittee on Education Finance held a hearing on the State Library's budget. Within this discussion annually, is also a presentation and request, made by CLA, in support of the Public Library Foundation (PLF).

During the first portion of the hearing, the subcommittee asked State Librarian, Dr. Kevin Starr a series of questions relative to the implementation of the \$350 million library bond measure that was passed by the voters in March of 2000. Specifically, Assemblyman Jerome Horton, a former member of the subcommittee was concerned that the regulations disadvantage small cities, in that larger cities "have more resources and know-how." He indicated that one of his city libraries would not be ready to apply by the first round deadline for applications in June of 2002. While he is not arguing to have the June date delayed, he proposed that the subcommittee consider two potential amendments raised in the subcommittee analysis:

"To address some of the potential problems, several suggestions have been made, including:

- Amendments to the regulations to provide for much less funding to be available in the first round, with most funding available in the second 2003- round.
- Amendments to the regulations to ensure that any funds not allocated in the first round should be carried over to the second round."

Dr. Starr told the subcommittee that as he was speaking on the issue merely as one member of the board, and not as the State Librarian, he would consider it very necessary to have all six of the library bond board members engaged in the discussion. Subcommittee Chair, Assemblyman Joe Simitian noted that in the coming weeks a meeting would be convened between the bond board members, the Budget Committee staff, his office, and the office of Assemblyman Horton. We have also been informed that Assembly Speaker Wesson's office will be an active participant in

these discussions.

In recent days, several library directors have received calls from their legislators inquiring as to the status of their applications and their feelings with regard to this issue. We wanted to let you know of this debate, in case your Assemblymember poses these questions to you on CLA Legislative Day, April 16.

At the conclusion of the discussion on the library bond, CLA was called forward to testify on behalf of the PLF. To compliment the previous discussion, we noted that one way to address the issue of the highly competitive bond applications would be to place a new \$500 million library bond measure on the ballot. CLA then thanked the subcommittee for their efforts in January, when they rejected a proposal made by the Governor to cut \$7.9 million from the PLF. Regarding the Governor's current proposal to cut \$11.2 million from the PLF, CLA argued that the Governor's action "takes us backwards significantly." We presented a chronology of the Governor's recent cuts, noting that the program would potentially be shouldering a disproportionate reduction of approximately 29 percent since January of 2001. Subcommittee member Assemblywoman Jackie Goldberg inquired as to how much of the PLF money goes for book purchases and materials. You may recall that the Assemblywoman has championed legislation for the school libraries, for book and materials purchases. CLA offered to obtain information for her in this area, at the request of the Chair. Chairman Simitian noted that as the budget deficit has grown increasingly ominous, the subcommittee would leave the issue of the PLF "open," meaning that they will revisit the issue once the Governor's May Revision is released and the legislature has a better idea of the state's fiscal picture. Action on this issue will likely be taken in late May.

Note: For those of you who may be visiting with members of the Assembly Subcommittee on Education Finance on Legislative Day, there has been a slight change to the committee's composition. Assemblymembers Jackie Goldberg and Wilma Chan have replaced Dennis Cardoza and Jerome Horton.

The Senate Budget Subcommittee on Education Finance will hear the issue of the PLF on Wednesday, April 17 at 1:30 p.m.

At its Meeting on February 20, 2002 the Library Board of Trustees requested a review of the meeting notification provisions of The Brown Act and that a Meeting Notification Policy for District Trustees be developed. At the March 20, 2002 Meeting the Board continued this item to the April 17, 2002 Meeting because Trustee Stark was not present to participate in the discussion.

Each of the Trustees was given a copy of *Open & Public III*, a *User's Guide to the Ralph M. Brown Act*, by Ted Fourkas, with the March Library Board Packet. Published by Capitol Enquiry, Inc. in Sacramento this annotated guide to The Brown Act is endorsed by many organizations including the California Newspaper Publishers Association, the League of California Cities and the California Special Districts Association.

The Brown Act defines a public body's relationship to the public. It does not address internal operations of the public body. Those relationships are defined by either the *California Code* or local policies and procedures.

Attachment A is a proposed Placentia Library District Library Board Meeting Notification Policy for the Board's consideration.

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Placentia Library District Library Board Meeting Notification Policy Proposed April 17, 2002

Notification for regularly scheduled meetings of the Library Board of Trustees shall be given by the delivery, by staff, of the Agenda, to the address of record as designated by each Trustee, at least seventy-two (72) hours before the meeting. A regularly scheduled meeting is one that falls on the date and time established by the Library Board of Trustees at its December meeting, or at a non-regular date and/or time that has been set by Board action at a regular Library Board meeting.

Requests to change the date and/or time of a regular meeting that occur after the previous Library Board Meeting, shall be made to either the Library Board President or the Library Director. At the instruction of the Library Board President or the Library Director the Library Administrative Assistant will survey each of the Trustees by telephone or e-mail to check for availability for the proposed date and/or time. The survey results will be forwarded to the Library Board President who will make the final determination about the meeting date and/or time. In the absence of the Library Board President the Library Board Secretary will make this determination. The Administrative Assistant will notify each Trustee by telephone or e-mail about the final determination for the meeting date and/or time. The Agenda will be delivered by staff to the address of record as designated by each Trustee, at least seventy-two (72) hours before the meeting. The Agenda notebook for each meeting that was not pre-approved by Library Board action for an unusual date and/or time will use a red cover page and the meeting announcement on the Agenda will note the "Unusual Date and/or Time".

Expect for emergency situations requests to change a Meeting date and/or time to an earlier date and/or time will not be honored if the Meeting date and time have been posted for the public. Posting generally occurs five to six calendar days before the Meeting. Once a Meeting has been posted it may be changed only to a later time and/or date. If an earlier time and/or date is needed a Special Meeting will need to be authorized by the Library Board President and posted and noticed to the media.

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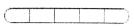

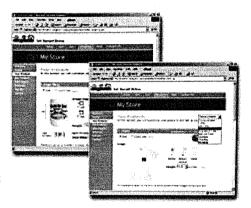

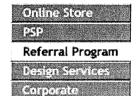

March Activities in the Children's Department

Programming- The winter programming ended late February. There were no regularly scheduled storytimes, lapsits, or musictimes in March.

School Visits- School visits have continued. Five classes visited during March. A total of 136 children participated in these visits.

Off-site Programming- Storytimes at the Placentia Community Centers and the Head Start classrooms have continued. There were 4 storytimes at the community centers with a combined attendance of 25. Three storytimes were performed for each of the seven Head Start classes with a combined attendance of 420.

Reading Incentive Programs- The In-N-Out reading program "Food for Thought" began February 3 and ended March 14. Children who read five library books earned a free hamburger. By the end of the program 286 children had signed up. This number is up approximately 100 participants from last year. One hundred and thirty-eight children had finished at least one bookmark, and 58 children had completed all three bookmarks. These numbers are up approximately one hundred participants and 30 participants from last years numbers respectively.

Other programs- The Placentia Library District again had the Springtime parties for children 2 – 4 years and children under two. They were both successes with a total of 39 children and adults attending the two events.

Summer Reading Program- Plans are under way for the 2002 Summer Reading Program. Our Way Out Wednesday performers are booked and teens have already begun volunteering.

Tutor Training. The Literacy Coordinator conducted two tutor training workshops during February and eight tutors were trained, four adults and four teens. All eight new tutors are matched and tutoring in the Library. The next tutor training is scheduled for April 7, 2002.

Families for Literacy (FFL) Program Status. We now have ten families in the FFL component.

Rotary Reading Assistance Program (RRAP) Continues. RRAP, a partnership with the Placentia and Yorba Linda Rotary Clubs, the Placentia/Yorba Linda Unified School District (PYLUSD), and the Library, continued in March. So far, we have trained more than 130 high school volunteers for this school year. We now have ten Esperanza High School RRAP volunteers tutoring at the Yorba Linda Library. We trained ten additional RRAP volunteers from El Dorado High School in March. RRAP offers high school students the opportunity to get community service hours by volunteering at local elementary schools.

Reach Out and Read Partnership Continues. In March, Placentia Library Literacy Services continued its partnership with St. Judes Medical Center and the Reach Out and Read Program, a pediatric-based literacy program. We want to continue to especially recognize one of our volunteers, Diane Martlaro, who goes to the Whitten Center in Placentia on Monday mornings and reads to children in the waiting room while they are waiting to see the St. Judes pediatric staff. We also want to welcome another great volunteer who has joined Diane at the Whitten Center, Ruth Petey Peterson.

English Language and Literacy Intensive (ELLI) Program Update. During the month of March, the ELLI Program continued to partner successfully with Ruby Drive, Rio Vista and John Tynes Elementary Schools, as well as with Head Start. Over 35 additional books were donated to the schools, and materials from the Department of Education were distributed to the parents of children in the ELLI Program. The renovation of the Literacy tutoring area was completed. Traci Kato-Kiriyama, Coordinator of the Little Tokyo Service Center's After-School Program came and observed the ELLI Program and was impressed with what she saw.

"It's an answer," Adams says, "but it's not the answer."

Turns out, libraries aren't all what they sed to be. There are big libraries, tiny ones, omputerized libraries and libraries aimed at serving specific needs, such as the law or medicine or the arts. What's more, libraries are evolving fast, in part because of budget issues but also because the information flow of modern life is so blindingly fast that nobody, no matter how smart, can expect to know enough to get by without at least a little extra study and research, often at a library.

Amid all of this, Orange County (and some neighboring cities) is about to enter a golden age of libraries. More library construction is under way or on the books than at any time in the past 15 years. When the local library boom ends, about two years from now, local card holders will be able to read newspapers and other fine literature in a virtual smorgasbord of library styles and sizes. The Costa Mesa branch is just one example of the trend.

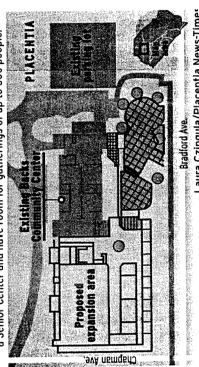

Grows them, that is, in his mother's back yard in Huntington Beach because he doesn't have the space for the likes of the 475-pound whopper he nurtured last year.

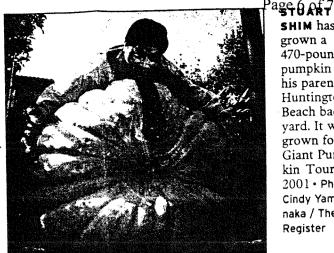
Shim loves to share his love for big pumpkins. And now is the time, he says, to start your soil preparation.

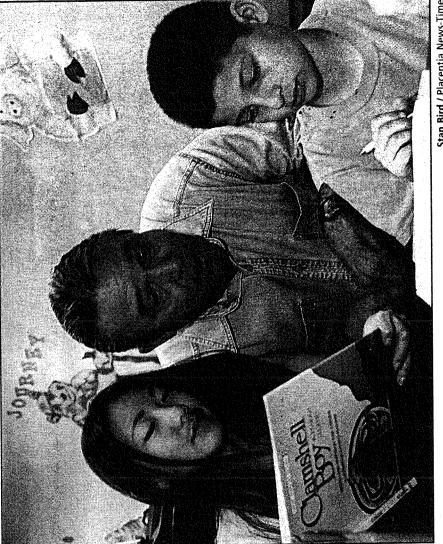

An involved community is a supportive community

Planning with community insight

o nonprofit can exist comfortably without community support.
Communities can and do support their nonprofit organizations in a variety of ways: some support nonprofits with tax dollars, through contributions to fund raising campaigns and with insights into the nonprofit's operations, programs and services

One essential contribution that board members make to their organizations is to provide the staff with a "read" on what the community is thinking—or might think. Is this a good idea for the nonprofit? Will the community support it?

Those are the types of questions that board members can and should provide perspective on. And nowhere is this more valuable than in strategic, long-range planning for the nonprofit.

Strategic planning is a key responsibility for any nonprofit board. It also gives board members a chance to provide insights into the community "mindset."

Here are a couple of ideas of what I'm talking about, in action.

1. A speaker of the month program that provides insights. Washington Board Member Penny Martin says the board brings in a speaker from the community every other month to update the board on what's happening in the community. "We have invited people to speak who run innovative programs, people who work in govern-

ment with a handle on what's coming in the future, and people who are involved in programs that we are interested in.

"A wide perspective from a diverse group of speakers is valuable when we are setting goals for two to five years down the road."

One essential contribution that board members make to their organizations is to provide the staff with a "read" on what the community is thinking—or might think.

2. In terms of developing a strategic plan, board members can bring a perspective to the job about the population of the area the nonprofit serves. "Board members can give their executive director a good understanding of what the community wants," says Illinois Board Member JoAnn Foster.

"We also may understand what the community might consider a bad idea. People in the community may not support an idea when they see something they consider out of line."

Finding board members who are as committed as you are

am hearing plenty of stories these days from nonprofit executive directors AND board members who are plainly frustrated with what they call "lazy" board members. They are talking about board members who miss more meetings then they attend, volunteer to help but don't honor commitments, and are essentially serving because a boss or friend asked them to.

But there's no real passion for board service.

I think that one cure for this ill is for board nominating committees to better screen prospective board members before inviting them to join. Use the following questions to help determine whether a potential board member has real passion for what you do, or the ability to develop it.

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Gold in Placer County's Libraries

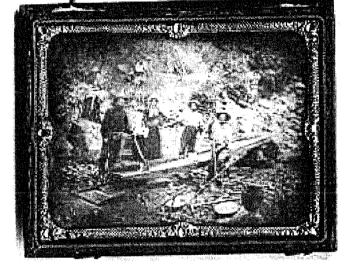

Since 1849, Placer County's gold has lured people to its oaky rolling hills, its craggy evergreen gulches. But 19th century mining veins have worn thin. Adventurers now beat trails to Placer County in the Sierra foothills for the rich

peacefulness it offers just 140 miles from San Francisco.

Placer County's libraries, many in Placer County's surviving Gold Rush towns, are shaping their services to meet the needs of the county's growing population of telecommuters and retirees. Elaine Reed, director of library services in Placer County, says that many patrons

she sees in her libraries have moved to the Sierra foothills to escape urban pressures, yet still remain close to their bay area roots. Reed says that Placer County's new library patrons are an educated, and technologically savvy group who crave the personalized touches that rural libraries can offer.

To better serve whom Reed calls "these real library users," Placer County's libraries are smashing tired myths of stern librarians amid dusty stacks. By opening new branches with dazzling new texts in seemingly tiny hamlets, by providing branches with Library of California statewide search and loan services, and by encouraging community members to "hang out" (with the inevitable to-go coffee cup) in their libraries, the Placer County library system is bringing a 2002 brand of customer service to the legendary foothills.

With so many telecommuters sailing down Interstate 80 to the bay area one to two times a week, Placer's libraries have a huge circulation of books-on-tape: they fly off the shelves of every branch in the district. But the small branches do more than just feed tapes to commuters.

One of those is Placer's Meadow Vista branch.

Just north of Auburn, the Meadow Vista library opened December 18. 2002. It started out with 6000 mostly brand new items, and public response to the library was tremendous. In its first month Meadow Vista circulated 3000 "The items. community looks upon the branch as a new bookstore in town, but better."

says branch manager Debbie Centi. While Meadow Vista's shiny collection gives the library a bookstore feel, the charming branch has what only libraries can offer - information specialists trained to give patrons access to the information the patrons need. The library has the best interest of the community as its mission, not profits.

The Meadow Vista library, which is secluded on the backside of the town's only supermarket mall, is leasing its space with county money. But, the library will soon apply for bond act money from the California Public Library Construction and Renovation Board to build a new library (see www.olc.library.ca.gov for Bond Act info and how your library can apply for state public library construction grant funds). LSTA helps county law library patrons access the Internet

County law libraries fulfill a unique public service role. Most provide not only varied legal resources such as standard, treatises and codes, but also online legal services and Internet access for legal research. But not all of the 58 county law libraries have Internet access.

The California State Library (CSL), through the federal Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) grant program, has given 15 county law libraries Internet access for their patrons. Now in its second year, the CSL's program will enable 15 county law library branches to do the following:

- Enhance library services by providing Internet access for public use and computer and Internet training for staff;
- Explore Internet technologies and provide guidance in the use of the Internet in a county law library setting; and
- Build partnerships between all types of libraries, community organizations, and local institutions.

Branches of the following 11 libraries are participating in this targeted grant program:

mouth travels fast" - at the local school, at the market, at the locally-owned coffee place - in Meadow Vista, old and new residents know exactly where the branch is, and what the branch offers: customer service.

Meadow Vista's patrons embody, at the local level, the shifting demographic of Placer County. Some are longtime residents and some, like Reg Boyt, an independent researcher who moved to Meadow Vista from San Jose in December because he wanted "a simpler-life and less of the desperateness of the city," are urban refugees. Boyt has volunteered to give basic web surfing and Microsoft Word classes to computer phobic patrons at the library's six Internet stations. "It's the least I can do," he says. "This place is the heart of the community and I want to give something back."

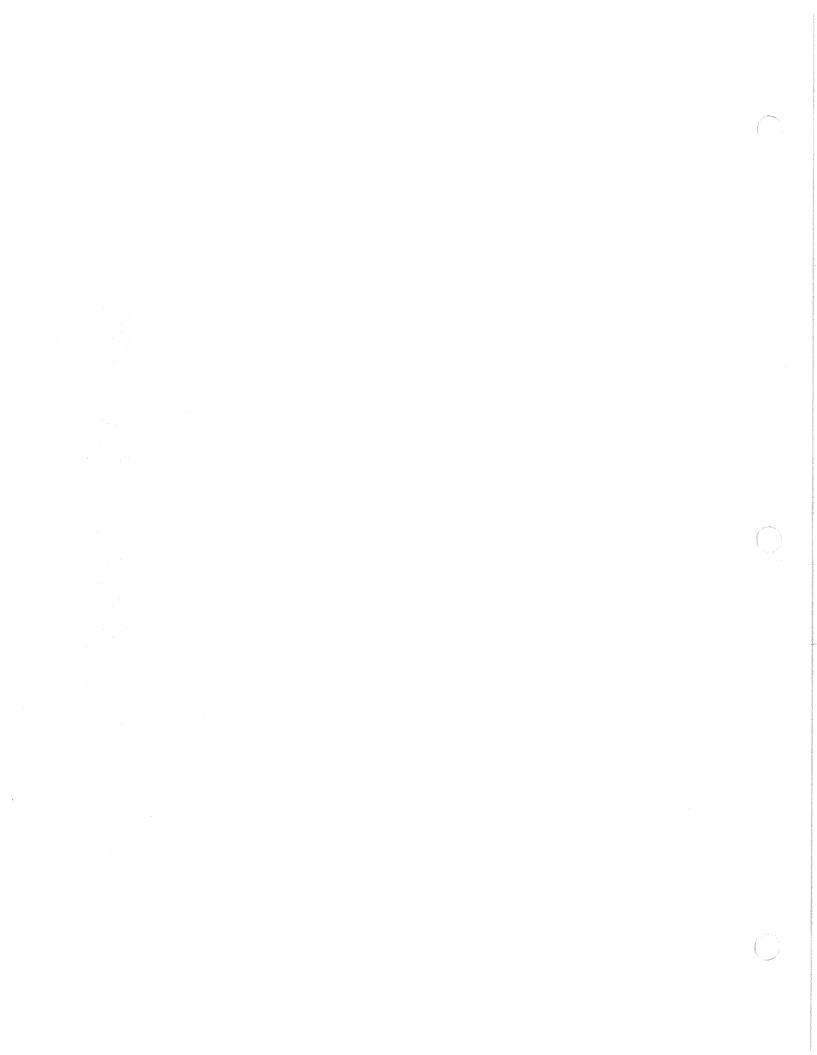
Longtime resident Susan Dewitt exalts that she is the library's "biggest fan." After a childhood without books, Dewitt, 47, is, with Debbie Centi's help and research, discovering and reading the treasures of children's literature. Centi uses interlibrary loans and Library of California searches to get Dewitt all the children's books possible because DeWitt reads one or two a day. "I never got to go to the library when I was a little girl," says Dewitt. "I'm trying

to catchup. The library has saved mysanity."

In even more remote Foresthill, up 20 winding miles on a two-lane road from Auburn, miners still work claims in the canyons around Foresthill's tiny library. The miners are "real can-do people," says Reed. In the Indian summer of 1999, wildfire threatened Forest Hill and five guys came, unasked, with pick-ups, station wagons and trucks to move their community's books.

Foresthill branch manager, Robin Guthries, says that, in addition to the old-timers, she has "lots of new residents" who commute "off the hill" to Sacramento everyday. Guthries has also seen an increase in home-schooling families who use the computer stations and Guthrie's online searching skills profusely.

Still, the miners who volunteered to haul the library's books to safety also make steady use of the Foresthill library. Guthries reports that the "summer river rats" working nearby claims are "true romantics" beneath their gruff exteriors. As they regularly trudge out of the canyons for western novels and poetry (they love Kipling and Tennyson), these patrons know where the truly precious gold is "in them thar' hills."



ELLI: The English Language & Literacy Intensive program sees results

California's public libraries have been actively working to advance adult literacy since 1984 and family literacy since 1988. Now libraries are helping even more Californians learn to read and write.

In 2000 Governor Gray Davis budgeted \$10 million in new funding--to be distributed over three years--for a new family literacy program called the English Language and Literacy Intensive program or ELLI. ELLI brings public library-based literacy programs to families who do not speak English at home. ELLI helps non-native speaking children in grades K-12 succeed in school by strengthening their English skills, including speaking, listening, reading, and writing. It improves the literacy skills of non-native

speaking children and their parents by using some of the same inductive and engaging strategies that public libraries have successfully used in adult and family literacy programs.

In fiscal year 2000/2001, twenty-two libraries statewide received funding for ELLI programs: 4,900 at-risk schoolchildren and over 1,500 of their parents were helped. Forty-nine libraries have received ELLI grant awards for fiscal year 2001/2002, which means nearly 12,000 Englishlanguage learning children benefit from these customized services.

Reaction to ELLI has been very positive according to a staff member working with the ELLI program at the Bruggemeyer Memorial Library in Monterey Park: "One of the parents of the program was a speaker for our annual Volunteer Recognition Event on June 30, 2001. She said that before participating in ELLI she never read with her two daughters. Now she reads a half hour with each of them every day."

Creative approaches to outreach and instruction are hallmarks of these ELLI programs. The California State Library has encouraged public libraries to target low-performing schools in their jurisdictions and to work closely with the schools to ensure that library efforts complement those of the schools. Aside from this advice, ELLI gives

libraries the freedom to design a program that best fits their local needs. Some of these innovative programs include:

- Weekly audio book discussions at middle and high schools (Berkeley);
- An ELLI van that brings programs to remote schools (Escondido);
- Therapy dogs to encourage children to read aloud in English (Los Angeles County);
- Art, music, creative writing, and storytelling classes (various libraries);
- Curriculum tailored to the Hmong culture (Butte County);
- Videoconferencing with classes in other parts of the U.S. (National City); and
- A bilingual poetry magazine written by the students (San Mateo).

For schoolchildren participating in ELLI, scores from Standardized Testing and Reporting (STAR), and the Stanford Achievement Test, 9th edition (SAT 9) have already shown improvement in reading, language, and mathematics. In addition to improved SAT 9 scores, the Huntington Beach Public Library reported that the ELLI children from Oak View Elementary School all showed improvement in their reading levels based on the results of the Basic Reading Fundamental Assessment (BRFA) test they took. Many of these children were in danger of not being promoted to the third grade before participating in ELLI, but by the end of the year they had scored almost one level higher on the BRFA than the general Oak View Elementary second grade population.

An ELLI staff member from Plumas County Library notes, "All in all, our students in ESL (English as a Second Language) and ELLI are becoming more comfortable in the community thanks to exposure through our literacy programs. Improved self-esteem is apparent, as our students are more visible and active in the community. Essentially, their improved communication has led to greater inclusion."The following libraries have ELLI programs:

Homework has just gotten easier with online tutors program

Get LIVE Homework Help

What is a Golden Rectangle? Who was Harriet Tubman? How long is the Milky Way?

For California children and young adults in grades 5 through 12, these and other homework questions or assignments can be daunting. Fortunately, students at these grade levels can now take advantage of a new homework help program called "Live Homework Help" that uses the Internet to link students with professional tutors located in cities all over the U.S. and that is being developed and tested via the federally-funded LSTA.

Live Homework Help is a unique partnership that began when Tutor.com, a leading provider of online tutoring services for educational institutions and individual students, approached State Librarian Dr. Kevin Starr about working together on a technologically-based homework help project. Starr referred the organization to Bessie Condos Tichauer, the children and youth services consultant for the California State Library.

The result of this partnership was Live Homework Help, the

first homework help partnership between Tutor.com and a state

library agency in the nation.

The project's purpose is to provide online homework help using public libraries.

Tutor.com's specially trained and certified teachers, college professors, professional tutors, and graduate students who are experts in math, science, social studies, and English provide the homework help. More than 50

public library jurisdictions applied for funding, with 39 of these applicants being accepted into the program. As a result, 5th through 12th graders can visit one of 47 public library branches from San Diego to San Francisco to receive much needed help with their homework.

"I'm excited about this program," said Bessie Condos Tichauer, children and youth services consultant for the California State Library. "It is directly responsive to the needs identified by teens during a series of statewide focus groups this past summer. Live Homework Help is the best of two worlds: technology and homework assistance."

But how does it work? California students in grades 5 through 12 can use Live Homework Help at designated computer terminals in their local public library. The service is

available 26 hours a week, Monday through Friday from 3:00 to 8:00 p.m. and Saturday from 11:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. The student types in his or her grade level and the homework help subject. Students then use the Tutor.com website to connect with a tutor through a special online classroom. This virtual classroom allows tutors and students to review homework questions or assignments using information technology features such as chat, interactive white board, or shared

web browsing. Tutoring sessions last 20 minutes, but students can use Live Homework Help again if they need additional assistance. A different tutor, however, may help them each time they reconnect.

Live Homework Help is supported in part by the U.S. Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) under the provisions of the Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA), administered in California by the State Librarian. "Thanks to the Internet, students will now enjoy the availability of a real-time one-on-one tutor as they grapple with complex subjects they must master to succeed in the 21st century," said Dr. Kevin Starr, State Librarian of California.

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Let's Talk Outcomes

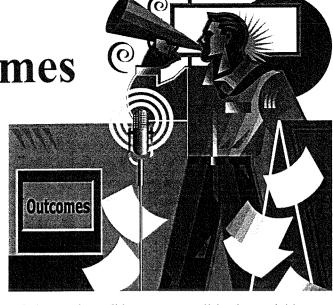

Want to get your corporate CEO to see the benefits of your special library to the organization? Trying to get a private foundation to understand why they should fund your Teen Center? Hoping to show your state or federal legislators that your library services really do make a difference to the taxpayers and potential voters? Then talk "Outcomes" to them.

So what do we mean by Outcomes? Well, it's a lot like what we used to talk about as *impact* on the end user -- but not quite. We've always talked about wanting to show the impact of our programs on the end user and lamented that we couldn't show real cause and effect for such impact. Nor have we had the resources to mount a huge evaluative effort to statistically prove such a connection to the results of our programs. Thanks to the original work of the United Way, almost a decade ago, and that of other large human service providers, Outcomes takes a less broad but equally-rigorous approach to assessing impact. The developers of this approach postulate that formally providing some evidence of the differences that their programs have made on their clients, even if that evidence is not as detailed as impact measurement implies, is still better than not providing any such evidence at all.

Outcomes tries to show that there has been a positive change in the target audience for a particular program, project, or service: to rigorously and statistically show that after the intervention there was a beneficial change in the attitudes, skills, knowledge, behavior, or even status or life condition of the program's clients or users. It does not try to prove (or assert) that all of the positive change can de directly attributable to their single specific program, project, or service. Instead, the proposal is that, without spending inordinate amounts of resources on evaluation (or proof of impact), this method uses a small amount of resources to show, rigorously, that a positive change has occurred after the organization's efforts. It asserts that it is logical and reasonable to assume that some, if not all, of that positive change is a result of those efforts.

More and more potential funders of human services are requiring this method of program design and evaluation. It is appropriate to many of the services and programs developed in libraries. It is not, however, appropriate to all library efforts. For example, installation or upgrade of an integrated, online library system, while a very important library effort, is not usually appropriate to Outcomes measurement as an indicator of success. Rather, such an effort is usually more appropriate to the more-traditional Outputs measurement



techniques (i.e., did we accomplish the activities we originally intended in the timeframe and budget originally proposed?) -- still an important success indicator for most efforts.

The California State Library (CSL) is currently engaged in a concerted effort to use Outcomes measurement as the basic design for most of our programs and projects, particularly those coming from the Library Development Services Bureau. We have been working on a deliberate implementation of these principles both internally and with the external programs with which we work. So far the efforts have been extremely positive. These efforts and the products of them are being documented for reference via the State Library's website at www.library.ca.gov and in future Connection articles.

You will certainly be hearing lots more about this tool, which is proving very valuable in the funding and justification efforts of those libraries that have tried it. In the meantime, if you would like to read more about the Outcomes approach to program management and evaluation, the following three publications should be helpful (there are **many** more):

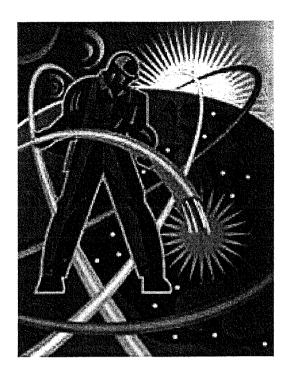

These forms will be much easier to fill out using a computer than the version currently printed in the Title 5 regulations.

The Excel version includes many formulae and linked fields that provide automatic calculations for the user. It is not necessary to have extensive knowledge of Excel to use this version of the form. In fact, the form was created assuming the user would have no knowledge of Excel. In order to use the Excel version all you have to be able to do is point, click and type in information.

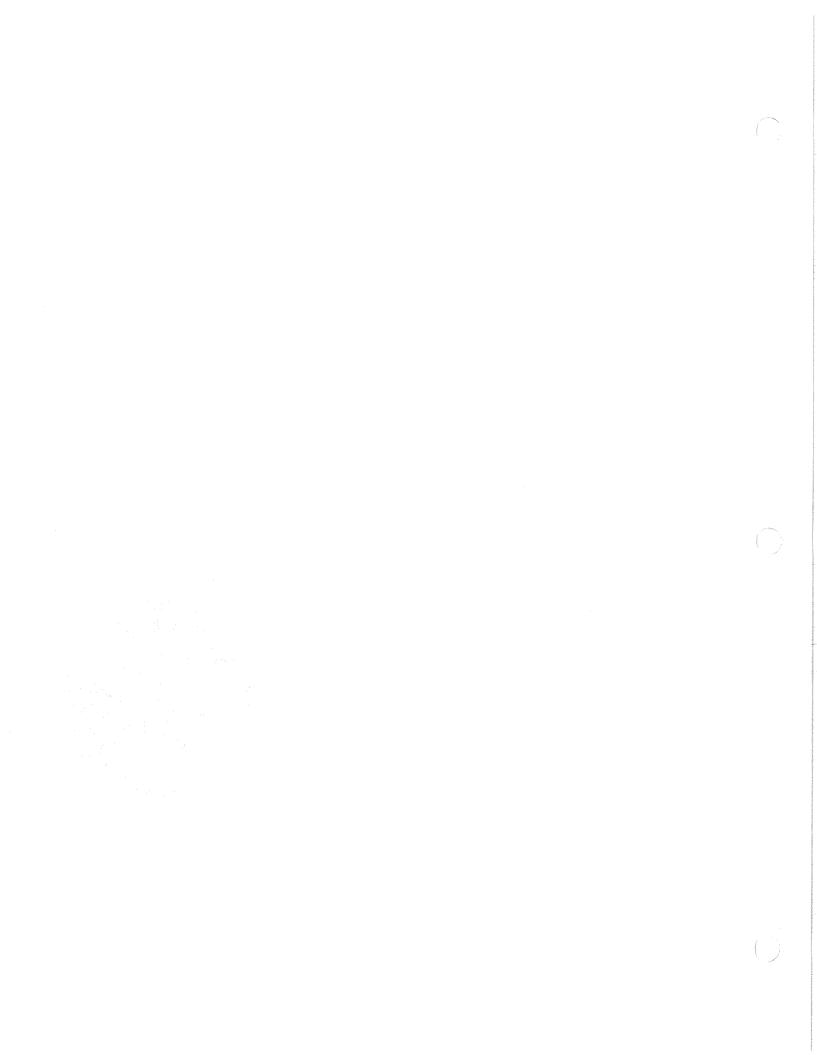

LEGISLATIVE UPDATE – April 12, 2002

RUMORS ABOUND AS BUDGET DEFICIT GROWS

While no one in an official capacity has so stated, it appears that the state's projected budget deficit continues to grow. The Davis Administration will release the May Revision in a few weeks and it is anticipated that the current projected state budget deficit of \$17.5 billion will be somewhat higher--some think as much as \$20-plus billion. Could be a very long summer in Sacramento.

LOCAL COALITION

CSDA has recently joined the California State Association of Counties (CSAC) and the League of California Cities in the Leave Our Community Assets Local (LOCAL) Coalition. The purpose of this coalition is to protect local government dollars from being pirated in order to balance the state budget. LOCAL will be hosting Legislative Action Days, a FREE state-wide news conference, on May 15-16, 2002 in Sacramento at the Sheraton Grand Hotel. Watch your mail for more information!

It is important to have a strong showing at this event – the Coalition is hoping to have hundreds of local government officials and other supporters at the action days. A number of activities will be scheduled during those two days including legislative office visits, news conference, budget updates, and outreach training. Please mark your calendars – and bring all of your governing officials – to Sacramento on May 15-16, 2002. Join your city and county colleagues speaking out for local government revenue protection.

LAFCO BILL PASSES COMMITTEE

On Wednesday, the Assembly Local Government Committee passed Assembly Bill 1948 by Assembly Members Kelley, Dickerson and Aanestad. As amended on April 1, AB 1948 would modify the manner in which health care districts' share of the 1/3 share of the LAFCO general operational budget is calculated. Current law, for those LAFCOs with special district representation, requires special districts to pay a 1/3 share of the LAFCO's general operational budget. In addition to the provisions relating to health care districts, AB 1948 would also cap at 50% any single special district's share of the 1/3 total. Currently there are numerous special districts that contribute well in excess of 50%. AB 1948 would modify the revenues that are counted toward calculating each special district's share of the 1/3: (1) Proceeds from the sale of bonds, and federal and state grants and loans; and (2) Assessments, fees, and charges collected for the purpose of making loan or debt service payments. AB 1948 does not change current law allowing special districts to develop an alternative funding formula, with the exception noted regarding health care districts. AB 1948 passed the Committee with a unanimous vote and was recommended for "consent" when the bill reaches the Assembly Floor.

ERAF LEGISLATION

Assembly Bill 2100 by Assembly Member Simitian, which would cap the ERAF over a period of years, passed the Assembly Local Government Committee on Wednesday on Consent. The bill moves to the Assembly Appropriations Committee.

A second ERAF bill, Assembly Bill 1865 by Assembly Member Canciamilla, which is similar to AB 2100, was considered on Wednesday by the Assembly Appropriations Committee and referred to the Committee's Suspense File. Given the Davis Administration's opposition to prior ERAF-relief legislation, we are not optimistic that either of these bills will reach the Governor's desk.

POLICE PROTECTION BILL ADVANCES

Also on Wednesday, the Assembly Local Government Committee passed Assembly Bill 2951 by Assembly Member Aroner, which simplifies language relating to special districts that provide police protection that qualify to receive supplemental law enforcement funding.

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Budget Remedies Could Hurt O.C.

The looming state budget deficit does not augur well for Orange County residents or the local governments that serve them. Preliminary estimates indicate that the state's budget shortfall will be at least \$17 billion.

Some observers, including the highly respected Legislative Analyst's Office, indicate the budget deficit could even be in the \$24- to \$25-billion range. Incredibly enough, the state has gone from a budget surplus to a budget deficit in a few short years.

There are many reasons for this looming budget crisis, but the primary cause has been a Legislature that could not restrain itself from spending the money that gushed into the state coffers during the strong economy of the late 1990s. Examples of fiscal imprudence in Sacramento abound.

The huge increase in salary and benefits for state prison guards is only the most recent example. Taxpayers writing checks to the California Franchise Tax Board this evening might want to reflect on the fact that state prison guards now make as much, or more than, police officers or credentialed teachers.

Prison guards need only have a high school education and minimal training. Police officers must undergo rigorous training and of course face criminals when they are not behind bars. Teachers need a college degree, a credential and experience to pursue their profession.

No matter how you slice it, the governor and the Legislature are in financial trouble. Clearly, they do not want to raise taxes until after the election. So Californians can expect to see some financial sleight of hand to conceal the budget shortfall until, say, the second Wednesday in November.

The last time the state was in a budget crisis, the Legislature and then-governor gleefully gouged local governments. They took local property tax revenues from cities and counties and gave some of it to the schools, thereby reducing the amount of state revenue that went to local education.

Expect more of the same. Cities and counties are most vulnerable to this tactic, but maybe this time the Legislature will be unable to resist taking money from the cashflush special districts. The Little Hoover Commission report of May 2000 gave some idea of just how many billions of dollars these special districts have sloshing around.

But special districts in California, and especially water districts, have jealously guarded their financial assets over the years. They have successfully turned back attempts by the state Legislature to get its hands on their money.

Now, special districts, especially water districts, are furiously designating dollars for capital improve-

ment projects, thereby hiding behind the fig leaf that such funds are "already committed." Their tactic is encouraged by recent changes in government accounting standards (the arcane but significant GASB 34 standard), which sanctions local governments to develop cash reserves for capital projects.

What will the swirling political currents in Sacramento mean for Orange County? The short answer is Orange County taxpayers had better get a tight hold on their wallets.

There are many things the Legislature might do to sidestep the budget deficit problem that would potentially hurt Orange County. For starters, the Legislature might change formulas for state funds going to local governments. Orange County school districts, cities and the county itself are already shortchanged by the state.

Orange County's legislative delegation has been spectacularly ineffective in looking out for the interests of county schools and cities. Orange County was getting less than other counties before the huge increase in the state budget that occurred in the late 1990s. The local legislative delegation couldn't even improve the financial circumstances of Orange County schools and cities when times were fat in Sacramento. Given their mediocre record, it doesn't seem likely they will do any better in the current

downturn.

Another tactic the state Legislature is likely to employ is to shift money to the general fund from various restricted funds, some of which fund freeways, roads and capital projects. What this means to Orange County residents is less state money for infrastructure improvement, or higher taxes. There are more subtle but no less painful ways in which the Legislature is hurting the Orange County economy. For example, recent state legislative actions have resulted in skyrocketing unemployment insurance costs.

This sop to the trial lawyers and unions will directly suppress the entrepreneurial activity and, hence, job creation, which is the font of Orange County's comparatively healthy economy.
